His fourth book Soil, Sweat and Tears focuses on amusing advice for reluctant gardeners. Brian has also written three books on amusing aspects of life in the 40s and 50s.

COMMITTEE CHAT

"Sometimes you feel you are talking to a brick wall", is a phrase I am sure we have all heard at some time in our life – almost certainly from our parents when we were growing up. Well, the Executive Committee (EC) feels the same.

In last month's Committee Chat, it clearly stated that, **"We must respectfully** remind all members that access to general meetings is via the side door at The Springhouse and from 1.30pm only. DO NOT come in the main entrance and queue in the corridor. You will politely be told to go out and come in the side door."

At our last General Meeting we had two EC members posted on the front entrance to re-direct members to the side door. Regretfully they were **subjected to some abuse** from 'members' who flatly refused to use the side entrance and others who used the excuse about needing the toilets and then 'conveniently' forgetting they should return to the main entrance and go around the side. **This will not be tolerated.**

Please realise that:

- u3a general meetings are private functions. The u3a hires the hall from the Springhouse. It does not give u3a members, or Springhouse members, right of entry, other than as directed by the u3a.
- 2. Entrance to ALL members is via the side door from 1.30pm, unless they have a disability that prevents them from walking up steps.
- 3. Members with a disability may enter through the main door from 1.30pm, accompanied by ONE PERSON ONLY.
- 4. Queueing in the corridor is a health & safety issue and, as directed by Springhouse Management, cannot be allowed.
- 5. Entrance to the hall from 1.30pm is:
- to allow time for the organisers to prepare the hall
- to count attendees for insurance and health and safety reasons
- to control ticket sales for trips and events.

The EC did not make these rules up for fun. The EC reserve the right to refuse admission to any member not complying with these rules.

A reminder that from 1st April 2024, new membership numbers come into effect for all members renewing their membership or joining the u3a. All interest group leaders will ask for your new membership card and record your membership number and a contact telephone number. For insurance and health and safety reasons, group leaders need to know who attends each interest group session and also to verify their membership is valid for 2024/2025.

At present the EC consists of 10 members, giving their time voluntarily to ensure our u3a operates as effectively and efficiently as possible for the benefit of some 450 members. Three of the EC will be standing down at our September AGM, leaving only 7 EC members left. Two of the EC standing down will have served their full 10-year term. We need to recruit additional members to the EC to ensure the continued success of youru3a. Nomination forms will be available from May. Anyone interested in joining the EC, please feel free to speak to any of the current committee members. We need new blood and new ideas please. More committee chat next month Our u3a is very fortunate to see an increase in the number of members who are willing to start up a new group and with almost 45 interest groups to offer our members, now is a **timely opportunity to remind all of our members that they should contribute to costs of running the group activity they participate in.** With car insurance going through the roof and fuel and general wear and tear costs continually rising, we must all pay our fair share of any costs necessary to make the groups happen.

Our Policy document clearly state the correct values that should be paid and these are shown below.

Mileage or transport costs for interest groups are to be met by those involved and sorted out by them. The standard calculation for the donation is 45p a mile plus 5p per person in the car and then the total is divided by the number of people in the car. This covers insurance, fuel and wear and tear.

Please do not wait to be asked for your contribution, offer your payment without delay. Group leaders, please do not be embarrassed to ask for these expenses using the above calculations. And this includes any general running costs like room hire etc.

Reminder: There's no such thing as a "Free Ride".

The preferred method of payment is Bank Transfer which is easy for anybody on Internet Banking. **The only thing I ask is for those paying using this method is that they send me an email confirming the payment. Also please put in the information box when paying, your name and membership number.**Alternative methods are of course cheque and cash, with this year an added option to pay by debit or credit card.

For those using Bank Transfer our bank details are Sort Code 20–34–69 Account Number 33122387. Unfortunately, 1 Member has paid using this method and failed to send me an email and their bank have not included any personal recognised date. I just have a reference number which means nothing to me, and also the Member did not include their membership number. The payment was received in the bank on 16th February.

If you don't have your new card then get in touch with the Membership Secretary. You will need to register your new number with any Interest Groups that you belong to.

Gardening Allotment News

The calendar says it's Spring. The recent warm days have encouraged trees and shrubs to, at last, start showing us the colour of their leaves. But it has still been very wet and the allotment has not had time to dry out between the showers and heavy spells of rain. Easter is approaching fast so now is the traditional time to plant potatoes. I have the bed dug but testing the soil by pushing the spade blade into the soil and rocking back and forth it sounded very squelchy so best to wait for it to dry out more before attempting to planting the potatoes. Too wet and they rot. Easter is early this year, so a few more days will not affect the growing period. April brings the showers and probably more heavy rain. Nothing changes year to year, so I say to myself just get on with it and work within the conditions provided. Easy to say, difficult to achieve!

As I have said before, my enthusiasm to go to my allotments to dig or tidy up the plot is a bit lacking. Not completely removed the weed and grass from around the bramble roots due to the constant spells of rain. In the summer I will be complaining about the lack of rain!!

I dug a small patch and planted a few shallots and have continues to dig for the onion sets. The top few inches are very solid where the soil has dried leaving it very wet beneath. The onion seed I set in the green house has produced thin onion plants which I have carefully transplanted into a deeper container to continue growing Same with the tomato, pepper and chilli plants I had growing in the heated propagator. Yes, it is getting very crowded in the green house.

I really do need a drier spell to plant at the allotment. Why did I ask for rain? Think I have said that before. Weather is always a good topic for conversation. I'm sure you will agree - us gardeners are never satisfied!!

The Memory Lane Group was founded by and for members to record their individual memoirs and the social history of their forbears to enable the stories of their respective families to be shared with their current families and this proved to be the case this very month.

Two members of the group attended family funerals to which they took not only flowers and condolences but also their memoirs and social history write-ups that related to the specific family of the deceased.

One of the instances was the funeral of a first cousin of a family member named Christine. Despite the regular exchange of Christmas cards, the member and the relatives of the deceased had not seen or conversed with each other for many years so when the ML member provided Michael 'the boy' – aged 84 years, and Caroline his sister her records of the family social history they were 'over the moon' with the write-up. Additionally, her nieces – the three daughters of the deceased – all requested e- mailed write-up details.

It was a similar story in regard to the other ML member who attended the funeral of a distant uncle but had not seen or conversed with several family members for many years and similarly also took with her the social history write-ups and the complete family tree so at the wake, the opportunity to provide details including birth, baptism, marriage certs, naval record and photographs added to the poignancy of their meeting.

Another ML member is due to attend a 90th birthday party of her father's brother and will similarly take her write-ups, certificates and photos to share with her family at this event.

These instances reinforce how the ethos of the Memory Lane Group has proved so worthwhile notwithstanding the pleasure and enjoyment experienced by its members and the enjoyment and ever-present laughter continued at this month's meeting on 12th March.

The focus topic for the March meeting was grandparents or a great grandparent. It was evident from the exchanged family stories, records and family photographs, just how hard family life was for the working classes in the mid-19th century – early years of the 20th century and the resulting early ageing effect that this had on our forebears. A great grandparent of one member – born in 1851– was widowed aged 27 with four young children and very little income so life was very hard, but went on to remarry two years later and have three more children. A photograph of this formidable lady dressed in black was provided but the hardship effect could be witnessed in just how old she looked for her years.

One member spoke about the many interesting holidays that she has had complete with providing photographs and maps and then at the end advised that in fact she had given a presentation at the Springhouse on this very topic – that is how good the input was.

The meeting next month will have been held on 9th April where the topic will be markets of bygone days and East End traditions.

It survived because it got damaged when it was being launched from the submarine and it was brought back to England and left in storage and forgotten about for many years until the owner of the museum spotted the canoe and bought it and had it renovated As well as many other exhibits we saw the original Embassy Siege assault kit used on the Iranian Embassy in London in 1980. *Photo on Brian McDonald's camera.*

The day finally arrived for one of our members at least to cross the Thames by ferry from Tilbury to Gravesend, for the first time. We had previously been thwarted by the extremes of weather caused by the inevitability of global warming. It was a fairly windy but warmish day and walking onto the ferry gangway resembled the old Cake Walk at the fairground if people can remember that. There were a number of passengers making the journey using their bus passes generously provided by Thurrock Council– something they did do right ! Many of us were of course, hoping this wouldn't be our last venture over to Kent by ferry before the subsidy by Thurrock Council was to end. Surely, somewhere bordering the Thames there must be a philanthropist who wants to help carry on such a noble and worthwhile tradition....!



We first of all, continuing the u3a tradition. found a cosy little café for coffee and snacks. Our main aim was to visit the Sikh Temple or Gurdwara. It is visible as soon as you disembark the ferry as the roof of the

building is quite high and it is one of the largest Gudwaras in Europe. Gurdwara means, 'the door to a new beginning'.

We were met by Jagdev a Sikh volunteer who I have been communicating with to arrange our visit. If anyone wants to arrange their own visit all details are online. There are certain procedures to go through but they are a very welcoming religion and feel it is important to be part of their community. Both men and women have to cover their heads before entering the temple and there are 2 separate areas where each sex has to remove and store their shoes. Jagdev first of all took us outside to explain some of the architecture and intricate murals. The temple has football pitches and they have both male and female teams. You do not necessarily have to be Sikh to join them. He also mentioned their individual flag which is vertical and wrapped and identifies their Gurdwara. Their car parks can also be used in conjunction with the local council on certain days They have a reciprocal arrangement. Yes, the site is very big.

On re-entering the Gurdwara I was very grateful for the underfloor heating as I had managed to step shoeless in the only puddle. It is an impressive site with magnificent stairs and balustrades and a lovely blue main dome. There is a lot of coming and going and you are made to feel very welcome. While of course remaining civilised, there is not a 'hush hush' feeling that you might get in a



church. Don't be put off by the many stairs if you want to visit as there is a lift.

Jagdev gave us a tour of about an hour and a quarter. He took us into the 300 seat and the 500 seat dining rooms where there is also a stage. These are

used for weddings and other ceremonies. We covered most parts of the temple and were lastly taken into the kitchens where there were mighty woks and vessels on off the floor gas rings. These were necessary to cook the food which is available all day for visitors, the community and the homeless. They sometimes also take the food to the homeless. Like many charities and communities in Britain, most of this is done by volunteers. I remarked on the Tesco trolleys outside the kitchen, 'Were they stolen...?' – tongue in cheek of course– Jagdev said that they do a lot of business with Tesco so, as with the car parks, there is a reciprocal arrangement. We were then led into the dining hall where we were welcome to eat and drink with no mention of money. I collected my tray and was given what I believe was a vegetarian meal which included rice, chapati, beans in sauce and spiced yogurt. It was much appreciated. I drank water but could have had tea. After this, Jagdev had to rush off to a meeting. We very much appreciated his time with us and he made it very interesting.

On making our way to the Wetherspoons in the main town we discovered that the temperature had dropped and the wind had strengthened. After eating, some of the group decided to make their way home. Those that stayed on photographed some more of the local architecture and managed to find the only seated statue of Elizabeth 2nd and the statue of the Seikh that Jagdev had mentioned who fought for England and his own country. He was commemorated for this. This took us almost to the ferry so due to the icy wind we decided to brave the choppy waters and head home on what we hope was NOT our last trip on the ferry. Pocahontas will have to wait till next time.

Wine Appreciation

This month we journeyed to the Rioja region of northern Spain. The geography of the area is also a contributing factor, spanning a terrain that stretches 75 miles from north-west to south-east resulting in diverse climates, topography and soil types – all of which further influence quality and wine style.

<u>Tempranillo</u> is the most important grape and is at the heart of Rioja's best wines. It makes abundantly fruity, light wines and has a special affinity with oak-ageing, becoming graceful, silky and perfumed with time. A typical crianza will be a blend of mostly tempranillo with some <u>garnacha</u> to add body. Graciano (a fine Rioja speciality, prized for its aroma and acidity) and mazuelo (the Riojan name for carignan which gives tannin and colour) are also used to complement the final blend.

Crianza: wines must spend a minimum of one year in oak barrel and one in bottle before release. **Reserva:** wines spend one year in oak barrel and two in bottle. Reserva wines are some of Rioja's finest. **Gran Reserva:** wines are usually made in the best vintages where the fruit quality is rich enough to support three years in oak barrel and two years in bottle. Many Spanish reserva and grand reserva come in rather beautiful wired bottles which, obviously do not improve the taste but look nice.

The wines we enjoyed: **Blanco 2022 –** This elegant dry white Rioja is fruity and easy drinking, made with Viura and Tempranillo Blanco grapes. Has notes of citrus, exotic fruits and fresh white flowers. This wine pairs well with seafood, tapas and salty snacks.12.5% alcohol content. 12.5% alcohol content.

<u>Rosado 2022 –</u> A fresh and lively dry rose with flavours of strawberries and red cherries, with floral aromas, made from Tempranillo grapes. Can be enjoyed served chilled with tapas and seafood. 13.5% alcohol content.

<u>Lomas del Marques 2017 Reserva, red –</u> Smooth and refined, made from Tempranillo and Graciano grapes, tasting of berries and spice and goes well with Lamb and pork. 13.5% alcohol content.

Our favorite was the red Reserva.
