Therefore, if you would be willing to contribute to your branch by serving on the Committee, this is an excellent option for you.

The Agenda and Nomination Slips will be sent out at the beginning of January to allow time for members to inform themselves of the Agenda and also to obtain support from other members should they wish to be nominated for any of the four Officer Posts or for the Committee — we DO need a few more Committee Members, by the way.

Completed Nomination slips should ideally be returned by the 6th February 2024 to the Vice-Chair/Business Secretary either by post or by handing in at weekly meetings. However, late nominations will certainly be considered at the AGM itself.
