

Ofcom study: Nine in Ten adults in the UK have come across content they suspected to be a scam

Nearly half of the participants in the study (46%) said they had been personally drawn in by an online scam, while two in five (39%) knew someone else who was a victim.

A quarter of those who said they'd encountered online scams had lost money as a result (25%) - with a fifth (21%) being scammed out of £1,000 or more.

More than a third (34%) of all victims also reported that the experience had an immediate negative impact on their mental health, increasing to nearly two-thirds (63%) among those who had lost money.

If you think you've been a victim of some sort of online fraud – or even if you've spotted a fraud but not been caught out by it - report it to Action Fraud straight away on 0300 123 2040

Scam letters from 'People's Postcode Lottery'

People are being told to watch out for a fake letter, which claim that recipients have won thousands on the People's Postcode Lottery.

This scam letter includes the People's Postcode Lottery logo and branding. It claims that your postcode has been randomly selected from the electoral roll database and says your 'win' is part of a programme to award money from previously unclaimed prizes. The letter asks you to call a number to claim your prize. At this point the criminal will ask you to provide personal information, which will likely include your bank account details.

The advice is to always contact the People's Postcode Lottery directly via a verified phone number (08081 098765), e-mail address or postal address if you genuinely believe that you may have won a prize.

How to spot the signs of a fake HMRC tax refund email

Criminals are sending people fraudulent emails pretending to offer people a 'tax refund' from HM Revenue & Customs. The Government has issued a warning about the scam which criminals use to try and steal personal details, otherwise known as phishing.

Included in the emails is a link which says the recipient can claim a tax refund. Once the link is clicked, a website opens with forms to fill in personal details.

One example of these emails used HMRC branding to try to appear legitimate, while stating: "After the last annual calculations of your fiscal activity, we have determined that you are eligible to receive a tax refund."

HMRC will never send notifications by email about tax rebates or refunds.

Criminals may spoof a genuine email address or change the 'display name' to make it appear genuine. If you receive an email like this, forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk and Action Fraud.





Useful tips to protect yourself:

<u>Passwords</u>: Use a strong and different password for your email using 3 random words. Your email password should be strong and different from all your other passwords. Your emails contain a lot of information about you that criminals can use to scam you or people you know. So it's crucial you use a strong password for your email account that you don't use for other accounts.

<u>Use your browser's password manager</u>: If your web browser offers to save your password when you're logging in or creating an account, always do so. These 'password managers' will help you create and store strong, different passwords for all your different accounts.

2-step verification (2SV): If you're offered '2-step verification' to protect your email and social media accounts, always use it. 2-step verification (sometimes called 2SV) helps to keep criminals out of important accounts, such as your email and social media, even if they have your passwords. It works by sending a code or PIN to a device only you have access to, such as your phone. Typing in this code or PIN helps to prove your identity. Never give that PIN out to anyone else.

Exploring Churches 2023

We started the year with a visit to Spalding St Paul's in January, a church which many of the group pass regularly but probably have not ventured within its walls. With no one in the church who could relate its history, but not wanting to turn down the opportunity to visit, I enjoyed researching stories of the area prior to and during the construction of the building.

Buildings of note were to be found in the area, including the original Fulney Hall, a post windmill near the site of the church, several farm houses including Fulney Farm house (still standing) which at its peak is believed to have provided food for the priory in Spalding, and a chapel thought to be around the entrance to the new Lidl store.

The occupations of the local people, according to Census records for 1851, 1861, 1871, reflected life in Spalding in the mid nineteenth century, especially the importance of the river.

Thanks to Canon Moore, a real driving force in the town with his 'finger in many pies', Sir George Gilbert Scott, a well known architect nationally and internationally, and Charlotte Charinton who generously provided the funds for the church (equivalent today to some £3 million), the church was opened in 1880. Inside it is bright with many unique features – well worth a visit.

February brought a trip to Deeping St James where we were entertained by Rev Sonia Marshall. Sonia escorted us around the building for at least an hour, pointing out many features and the stories behind them.

The font especially is of interest, being a tub font produced from a lump of stone and differing from the often traditional octagonal shape. One, Robert Fayrfax, was baptised here and he is considered to be the most prominent composer of sacred music during the reigns of Henry VII and Henry VIII.

March took us to Skirbeck St Nicholas in Boston where we again met Father John Underhill who we previously saw at Fosdyke last year. The church is particularly old and in the past, prior to diverting the river, it suffered from flooding. Erosion to pillars and walls is a problem here. Father John took us through a brief history and explained some of items he uses in the services. Sadly, but happily for him, he is leaving Boston for another post in the south west. His care and enthusiasm will be a hard act to follow. Thank you, Roger for arranging this.

Many of us will have travelled along the A52 from Donington to Grantham without venturing off the beaten track. Chris has ventured off and he arranged a visit to Swaton, some four and a half miles from Donington. This old building is one of a group of five or six churches, its size making it a prominent feature in the small village. There was a definite 'wow' factor on entering through the main door. Again, the weather has caused damage over the years.

King John was reputedly a friend of the Lord of the manor and his wife, who is thought to be buried in the church, and like many other churches, claims to have stabled Oliver Cromwell's horses overnight before a local battle. An interesting feature of the visit was The Hut in the churchyard, extremely well equipped with facilities to act as the church hall, village hall and even the local pub with bar on a Friday night.

Each church has welcomed us warmly with refreshments and an average of thirty people per visit have enjoyed the hospitality. I continue to be indebted to Chris Briggs, Andrew Hawkins and Roger Smith (listed for no other reason than in alphabetical order!) for their enthusiasm and support in arranging different venues. Without them it would be much harder.

Needlework 2 visited Peterborough Cathedral recently to see the Threads through Creation display. It was absolutely stunning! 12 hangings depicting the Creation and Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden! It took 3 years to complete and over 8 million stitches but what was just as astounding was the vision and creative thinking behind it! These are just two of the amazing panels!



In addition we were lucky enough to see a group of ladies working on a canvaswork embroidery that copied the pattern on the painted 13th century Nave roof! This 4 metre by 1 metre project was commissioned by The Royal School of Needleworking 1986 but work only commenced to celebrate the cathedral's 900th Anniversary in 2018.
