# A Speaker Organisers Year

The year started with an unusual speaker format where Cathy Shelboune gave us several short accounts of maritime heroes as selected from her pack of cards. The year continued with a musical insight into Gilbert & Sullivan.

March saw us learning about the toxic effects of arsenic and how Cornwall was the world's biggest exporter of the substance as well as the tragic accidents that occurred when arsenic could be mistaken for sugar!

April's speaker gave us an insight of life in the 1960 decade which many of us could relate to. Then the next months followed with the history and origins of the travel company Thomas Cook and the rise and fall of seaside resorts since 1750.

July saw what many members have suggested was one of the best presentations for many years, a talk by Martin Orkin on "The Beatles Story" with many music extracts which got feet tapping and even some singing.

The latest speaker so far this year was the author Philip Caine who gave us an insight into his career that took him from Barrow to Baghdad and how this led to him becoming a well-known author of the Jack Castle and Shackleton Blister series of books.

Coming this month is Nigel Start giving us a "History of Gardening in Britain." October it is Roger Leivers with "House of Spies" which has local interest as the house referred to is in Godmanchester.


