Are you receiving me?

We quite often hear from members that our emails sent via Beacon are not received, or end up in junk/spam boxes. Many email services are tightening their security requirements, to try and prevent access from scammers which is a good thing. However, you may need to adjust your settings to enable messages from trusted senders, such as u3a via Beacon, to get through. Everyone's devices and email providers have different ways of enabling this, but if you go into your settings, you should be able to see something like a 'trusted senders list'. Please add the Beacon address to this list. It is noreply@u3abeacon.org.uk

If you cannot see this list in your email settings, you may need to go into your account on your provider's website, and access your settings there. Another way which may prevent messages going to spam, is to add the sender to your email list of contacts or address book.



We aim to leave Kedleston Hall for Calke Abbey at approximately 12.00.pm (It is a 40 minutes coach drive)

On arrival at Calke you could choose to have a late lunch followed by a free flow House tour or go straight onto the House.

Memory of Aug. visit to Stowe

Back in August we were privileged to take our outings group to visit and enjoy the jaw dropping splendour of Stowe. It is the largest private neoclassical building in Europe which sadly went into decline but restoration was started in the year 2000 and to date £40 million has been invested in restoring it to its former glory. One of the many fascinating stories relates to the restoration and return to Stowe of the Lions that once guarded the South Front entrance. The lions had found their way to Blackpool, having been purchased by a philanthropist, who gave them to the town for display in Stanley Park.

Concerned that they were vulnerable to metal theft the corporation proposed lending the Lions to Stowe in return for exact copies.



An agreement was drawn up and a spell of therapy in a conservation workshop restored the spring to the lions' step so that on a crisp bright day in April 2013, they set out on the last stage of the journey home to take their rightful place guarding the entrance that has welcomed visitors since the 18th century.



An arrangement was agreed that anyone visiting Stowe who could prove they were residents of Blackpool, is granted free admission.

Among the many architects involved over the years is the unlikely inclusion of Clough Williams, Ellis who you will know as the famous architect of

Portmeirion in North Wales. He was charged with transforming the site into a public school.

His task was very different from his predecessors, who were engaged to embellish and update in line with changing tastes, lifestyles and ambitions. His brief was to achieve a seat of creativity, learning and endeavour.

His starting point was a long-neglected Palace of 400 rooms to deal with without water supply, drains, heating, lighting, or even adequate maintenance.



He achieved this in a matter of months. Somehow the huge building was transformed into a reasonably functioning school starting with 200 boys in four separate houses. This number was increased two or three-fold later on.

A fascinating visit followed by Stowe National Trust with a rather delayed lunch and guided walk for those who still had the energy. Wendy Wagstaffe

We do use the guided bus occasionally to arrive at the start point, e.g. Fen Drayton lakes.

We start at 10.00 am and often end up in a coffee shop at the finish.

We currently have a listing of approx. 35 members and generally have 12 - 20 attending, but not always the same members.

Our walks are not generally quick as we regard this as social time for chatting and making new acquaintances, as well, of course, for exercise and to explore our local environment.

We also try to make the walk location relevant to seasonal weather conditions.

Obviously, we prefer to use country paths whenever possible, but if necessary we use village/town roads and pathways if required.

We communicate via emails and phones, giving at least a weeks' notice of the walk we intend to do, complete with starting point Post Codes.
