Membership Renewal – IMPORTANT, PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

Your membership of St Ives u3a is due for renewal on 1st April 2024. Now that we have use of the Beacon system to record member details, we do not need to send out renewal forms each year.

The fee remains unchanged at £13 (£9.50 if you have paid a full fee to another u3a) and will cover your membership until 1st April 2025.

Methods of payment

Many of you have already set up a payment to go out by standing order on 1st April each year, in which case you need do nothing now. A few people were unable to change the date of their standing order last year, and payment has already been received. Those people will receive a separate notification from the Treasurer, either by email or letter. Please check before making payment, as it causes extra work when refunds are required if people pay twice. If you have not already arranged a standing order payment, the options are:

1) BACS payment to: St Ives Cambs U3A account: Sort code 40-40-35, Account number 41529994

Please enter to the reference your **membership number** (shown on your membership card), followed by **surname**;

2) The bank has recently introduced significant charges for paying in cheques and we would be grateful for your assistance in keeping this to a minimum. If you do not have online banking, you can request your bank to make a payment for you over the counter, by giving them our bank details, as for a BACS payment above. For future renewals, a standing order payment is preferable. Please request a form from our Treasurer/Membership Secretary to set this up. If a cheque really is the only option for you, please make it payable for £13 (£9.50 if full fee paid to another u3a), to: **St Ives (Cambs) U3A and print your name and membership number on the back.** Cheques can be posted to the Treasurer at: 4, Margetts, Hemingford Grey, Cambridgeshire PE28 9EP. **Membership cards:**

Membership cards will not be reprinted and your card issued last year remains valid, so long as you renew your membership, as this is a card for life. The card is not dated because the Beacon system will alert us to any members who do not renew.

We very much hope that you will wish to renew your membership. If you have any queries relating to membership renewal, please do not hesitate to get in touch with me, and if it is not your intention to renew, it would be helpful if you could let me know.

SGM - Special General Meeting April 11th

(Included in the Open Meeting) From Peter Cooper – Web Manager

Our **Current Constitution** has been in place since our founding, and was last amended in 2018. There are various limitations with our current constitution so the Committee propose that we adopt a New Constitution based on the Model Constitution supplied by the Third Age Trust. We are a charity, and this new constitution has been approved by the Charity Commission.

For us to adopt a new Constitution, we need to hold a "Special General Meeting" (SGM) to which all members are invited. We have given notice with the March Magazine that this SGM will be held as the first part of our regular Open Meeting on April 11th at 2pm in the Corn Exchange.

There will be **only one item on the agenda** for our Special General Meeting - the proposal that we adopt the New Constitution. We use the rules of our **current Constitution** when we vote on the proposal, thus:

If there is no quorum then the SGM will be adjourned to May 9th, at which the quorum will be the members that come. Once there is a quorum, if the proposal is passed by **two thirds** of those present and voting, then the new Constitution takes effect immediately.

I have done a Constitution Analysis comparing the current and new Constitutions in detail.

Robert Adams created this show Palace of the 1760s The house is framed by historic parkland and boasts opulent interiors intended to impress.

Afternoon visit to Calke Abbey With peeling paintwork and overgrown courtyards, Calke Abbey tells the story of the dramatic decline of a country house estate. The House and stables are little restored, with many abandoned areas vividly portraying a period in the 20th

century when numerous country houses did not survive to tell their story.

We aim to leave Kedleston Hall for Calke Abbey at approximately 12.00.pm (It is a 40 minutes coach drive)

Starting out as a 4 hectare plot, today this jewel in Hamilton covers over 50 hectares. When the idea of creating a public park in the south of the city was proposed, the director suggested that it could be a living museum of garden designs from across the centuries and the world. My presentation will 'walk' those present through the initial typical local authority parkland and then into the 22 gardens laid out along the bounds of the Waikato River.
