Mutual aid behind a volunteer appeal

THIS successful appeal was circulated to members of an Eastern Region u3a by its chair.

Dear Members.

I am sorry to have to bring this up but we do need your help.

When you sign up you agree to abide by the principles of the u3a.

One of these is the Mutual Aid Principle, meaning it is an organisation run by its members for its members.



This has been brought to a head recently by an appeal for volunteers to help make the tea at monthly meetings once a year, we had one volunteer.

I put an appeal in the last newsletter for volunteers to help at monthly meetings on the odd occasion it is called for, not a single offer was forthcoming. I appealed at the November meeting for more help for the December meeting, which is the start of the renewals and therefore will be busier than normal. We had one volunteer. I know that it is a busy time for us all, but sometimes we do need extra help.

I appreciate that having retired you feel that work is in the past and I will say at this point that there are many hardworking members within our u3a, namely the Group Leaders, their deputies and the Committee, but there a whole host of members who could do more. This help may come in the form of helping within your group, stepping up to be a Leader if required, becoming a Group Leader of a new group with support from the Group Co-ordinator, to volunteering for the tea rota, helping at the monthly meeting by covering the sign up table, checking membership cards, directing members to the renewals table or manning the raffle.

I would ask you to please consider offering your help if you can, to help create a healthy and thriving u3a. One that we all can enjoy.

<u>Comment from Trustee Barbara Cordina</u> Liaising directly with members is one of the best ways of finding volunteers. A personal approach beats any other. Members' involvement in their u3a starts from the day they enrol and the fact that every member is a volunteer needs to be reinforced whenever possible by the committee. It is very rare that I hear members being reminded at general meetings that contributions are appreciated from everybody. Often newsletters do not cover this aspect either. A new approach from the day of enrolment is required to ensure that all members are aware of the contribution they can make to this unique organisation.

Visit by Barbara Cordina - Trustee - 17th April 2023


I was delighted to spend an afternoon with the members of Limebrook u3a, together with team member Marilyn Walker.

Ian creates national word game success

THOUSANDS of attempts have been made to solve Aileen's Game created by East Suffolk u3a member Ian Clarke. He is sharing it online after a labour of love that he estimates took him between 400 and 500 hours to perfect.

It is on the national u3a website and free to all members and the public ... to enjoy.

But the original concept of creating as many words as possible within a grid came about a long time ago.

The origins stretch back more than half a century to when lan was a teenager spending his summer holidays in America, but stayed within the family till Wordle exploded in popularity.

He explains, "The game came about back in 1965. Mum and I had been visiting her sister in Canada and were taking a greyhound bus from Thunder Bay to Cleveland, Ohio to see her uncle. "My mum loved word games, loved them — even in her 90s, she was a mastermind at scrabble. We were just on the bus, playing with word games and a piece of paper. "Somehow we came up with this game — we had a grid of 5x5, and we each came up with alternate letters. And we liked it."

Over the years, the game has become a regular source of entertainment for family and friends but Ian always assumed that, without technical developer skills, that was the furthest he could take it.

lan continues, "I thought it would make a good app. But I didn't know how to make an app." And then another word game sensation came along; Wordle.

On discovering that it was written in Javascript, lan realised that he might be able to use a similar basis for his game, creating it as a webpage.

It re-sparked his dream of making the game available for anyone to play.

lan says, "It became last winter's project. I don't know how long it took me – between 400 and 500 hours. Most of that was me on Google was saying, how do I...?

"Then finding a bit of code and trying to figure out how to make it do what I wanted it to do. "It's quite simple but I didn't know how to do anything so that's why it took me so long." Being on the national website he sees as fair reward for all his efforts.

He says, "This is the reward. I've created this thing and it just feels so great that people are enjoying playing it.

"That feels really fantastic. For months until I was confident it worked, it has just been family and friends testing the online game and sharing their scores with each other. It's a very exciting time."

An example of what a chariot would have looked like was in the Roman Circus House for them to see.

The castle still stands on Roman foundations and was built largely by William, starting in 1076.

It has one of the largest intact Norman keeps anywhere in Europe.



A group formed and recreated underwear, shirts, ganseys, slops, waterproof doppers, stockings, caps and gloves and sea boots.


