GARDENING GROUP

Greetings from the garden.

I hope you all had a good Christmas and new year whether you love the season or are a Bah humbug like me.

As I write this the temperature outside is a ridiculous 11 degrees and I have winter pansies and polyanthus in flower? I am always amazed at how tough some flowers are with snowdrops and crocus pushing through ready to flower soon. No matter what the weather, they will dance in the daylight and if needed, they will push through the snow too. I always think they are the promise of the spring to come. Crocuses in their 3 main colours followed by dwarf Irises and winter Aconites can raise a smile on the darkest of days and remind us that the days are now getting longer, another promise of warmer days and spring sunshine.

If you want a job to do, there are plenty to consider. It's time to get the seed packets out if you haven't already done so. Got some that are out of date? They may still grow so find a place for them and sprinkle them on the soil following the instructions on the packet, you may get a pleasant surprise later in the year. If you have a greenhouse, get it cleaned ready for planting later and make sure that all tools are cleaned and oiled.

Plant of the month.

It has to be the Christmas favourite, Poinsettia or Christmas star. This is one of the Euphorbia family but it is a tropical plant and needs to be kept in a warm well lit room, so a windowsill, but out of draughts. The lovely red, pink or white "flowers" last up to 6 weeks. This is because they are not flowers but bracts or modified leaves. There is a tiny flower at the centre which is barely noticeable. Most people discard the plants after Christmas, which is a shame because they can be coaxed into flowering again next year. So to save you buying a new plant each year, here's how to care for it. Water your poinsettia sparingly and mist the leaves regularly to extend the life of the lovely red bracts. When they start to die back, feed with a potassium rich plant food like tomato food. Ideally, keep the plant at around 13 to 15 deg C. In April, prune the plant to around 4" and maintain the temperature. They don't like draughts so make sure to keep away from doors and even open fireplaces. In early May, repot into a slightly larger pot with fresh compost and maintain the temperature but don't allow it to get over 18 Deg C. Water and feed once a week, only watering when the top of the compost is dry.

From late October move your plant into a dark place for 12 hours each day. This will encourage it to start forming the coloured bracts. Keep it warm at all times 17 - 18

Deg. Once the bracts start to form, mist the leaves daily to keep it in good condition and bring it out into the light again as the night will now be drawing in naturally.

If you want more plants, take cuttings when you prune the plant in April. Take a cutting just below a leaf, remove the leaf leaving a couple of small leaves at the top. Leave for 24hrs in a warm dry place, then place two or three cuttings around the edge of a pot filled will compost. If you have rooting powder, dip the cutting into it before planting. Water sparingly. Up for the challenge?

The other very important thing to do is look after the wildlife in your garden. I often hear people say they won't put out food for birds because it encourages rats. Every garden has rats, mice, slugs, snails etc. etc. You may not see them, but they are there. As long as they stay in the garden, they are fine and it's up to you to make sure there are no broken air bricks or other small holes inviting them to take up residence. The food chain relies upon the whole variety of creatures that inhabit your garden so don't be afraid or worried, each has a job to do. Strong smelling plants like garlic, onion, mint and lemons will deter animals from entering your home and you can get plugins that emit a sound inaudible to humans that will make rats, mice and squirrels move home. These plugs are safe to use with cats and dogs, but not with birds. So fill up the feeders and make sure there is always liquid water and look forward to the spring. It's just around the corner.
