It was a very comprehensive collection, comprising beautifully illuminated MSS and incunabula plus translations, dramatisations and even animated cartoons. There was also a wide range of items inspired by Chaucer' s characters. But the star exhibit was undoubtedly the Hengwyrt MS (see photo left), one of the two oldest existing copies of the Canterbury Tales, which was produced by Chaucer's own scribe, Adam Pinkhurst.

After viewing the exhibition we enjoyed an excellent pub lunch at the King's Arms.

The next meeting of this group will be the last, so this was a fitting climax to 14 years of exploring the works, life and times of Geoffrey Chaucer. *Thank you, Patricia, for organising the day.*

The name Shakespeare Morris was chosen in 1959, since when the team has always been in demand for Shakespeare Birthday celebrations, May Day festivities and the Mop Fair. In 2015 it welcomed female dancers for the first time.

The meeting ended with an energetic demonstration, and we all left feeling very cheerful!

Citizen Science: would you like to be involved? We received this email and wondered if any of you might be interested, if you are please apply directly

I am a PhD student at Royal Holloway, University of London. I work on pollinator conservation and citizen intervention and am looking for volunteers for the second year of the citizen science study called 'Optimow'. This study will be looking into how you can manage your gardens to help bees, butterflies and other pollinators. In the study you will be given a mowing frequency to follow and then you will count pollinators in your garden each week. The study will take 15-25 minutes a week. No experience is required and we provide all information and training needed easily and for free.

This is the second year of the study. In 2023, we had an amazing 180 participants and saw a 75% increase in pollinator numbers in one of the groups!! We hope to build on this work, so we have robust advice to give members of the public about managing their lawns to help pollinators.



Stratford upon Avon u3a monthly meeting report. Wednesday 27 March 2024.

The AGM was followed by an informative and amusing talk by **Bill Cowley** on **SCAMS** and how to avoid them.

Bill works with 3 orgnaisations:

Home Instead (care services)

This is a world-wide organisation providing care in people's homes. Bill works in Birmingham and the West Midlands.

Think Jessica

This old lady was the victim of many postal and telephone scams for many years. She did not understand that she was being defrauded of monies she thought were going to charities. When she died (after a lot of stress) 30,000 pieces of correspondence were found.

Take 5

This is a corporate campaign to lobby the government to do something to protect people. A Hand symbol indicates "take 5 minutes" to consider whether this communication is legitimate.

Bill is Communities Manager with Home Instead after a career with Vodaphone and BT, specialising in cyber security. One person in 17 has been a victim of a scam, and this is worth £7.5bn. a year. The average age of the victim is 75. Children are also victims and young people using social media are very trusting.

There are 4 main categories of scams:

- Post some create a feel-good factor, e.g., giving to charity or saying that you are owed some money (often from HMRC) but others deliver threats, e.g., non-payment of a bill. 21,000 people fell for a scam which asks for money to claim some sort of benefit.
- Telephone This is a massive problem and the pressure tends to be urgent, e.g., to make a bank transfer from one's hacked account to a "safe" account.
- Online Some pretend to be BT or another provider and then place "trojan" malware on the computer. Another common scam is the text to mum or dad saying that the child has lost his/her mobile phone and they need money urgently. Again the recipient is pressurised to act quickly. The "Voucher" fraud is another common one asking people to purchase these for their work or friends.

Face to face – these are rarer, e.g., fake workmen cold calling and doing bad jobs, and rogue traders.

Telephone callers are often poor workers who do not know that they are doing something fraudulent, often from abroad, or they are under pressure.

Regarding messages online – always look at the real URL at the top before clicking on it.

The "lost pet" fraud on Facebook is quite common as it is hacked all the time! Scammers often pretend to be the RSPCA or similar.

USEFUL INFORMATION ABOUT SCAMS

Below are some websites you might find useful. Any of us might come in contact with scammers and there are a few basics to remember. Not everyone on the phone is who they say they are, so even if they say they are from your bank don't give them any personal information. I have even heard of people called allegedly by the police, but it is someone trying to get your bank details. If in doubt put the phone down. Scammers will also try to use email, texts and Whatsapp, if it looks to good to be true, it probably is so ignore or delete the messages.

There will be a sheet at the meeting with some information about who you might contact if you suspect you have been scammed, but meanwhile below are some details:


