Liz will talk about the work of the Woodland Trust in Warwickshire. There are several sites nearby, managed by the Woodland Trust, where there is a wealth of wildlife



Our second outing of the summer found us at Holy Trinity where two guides took us around the church looking into many of its features. Myths about the Shakespeare tombs were dispelled, and we will surely do more research now into the Combes, Thomas Balsall, James Kendall and others with major monuments. The Becket Chapel was interesting for its discoveries, including the original mediaeval altar slab dug up from beneath its floor where it had been hidden during the Reformation. It is now in place on the High Altar. And one piece of trivia: Some believe that Shakespeare may have translated Psalm 46 - on his 46th birthday even: the 46th word of the psalm just happens to be *shake*, and the 46th word from the end is *spear*. Make of that what you will!

### Monthly meeting report – Wednesday 26 July 2023 - Barry Watson – The Agony & Ecstasy of a Canal Hotel Boater.

Barry Watson entertained and informed the audience with amusing tales of his time running a hotel canal boat from 1997-2002. He started with a bit of history, pointing out that the first canal was built by the Romans – the Fossdyke Navigation. The first canal of modern times was built in 1761 by James Brindley for the Duke of Bridgewater, from his coal mines in Worsley to Manchester. The second was for Wedgwood – the Trent and Mersey canal. In the 1790s there was canal mania. According to Barry, Birmingham has more canals than anywhere else in the world.

The railways and improved road transport led to the decline of the canals and the last commercial canal closed in 1970. Luckily some enterprising people waged a campaign to save them and the Inland Waterways Association was started to look after them, mainly for leisure purposes.

However, there were hotel boats before this, in the 1920s on the Norfolk Broads, and from the 1950s on canals. Business declined in the 1990s as more comfort was required. Barry and his wife Pam's boat had ensuite bathrooms in the 4 single cabins and 2 doubles, plus wardrobe and vanity unit and pleasant common areas.

The Agony – they worked for 31 weeks a year, 6 days a week. They cooked several meals a day – early morning tea plus a newspaper (which Barry went out to buy), breakfast, elevenses, lunch, tea and cake and 4 course dinner, plus a hot drink before bedtime! On one night there was entertainment. Barry sang a couple of songs for us. There was also a "butty", an extra boat towed by the barge, with a lounge and bar. Some of the canals and locks were very awkward, especially with the butty in tow. The service was rated 5 stars, of which Barry is very proud.

The worst jobs were emptying the toilet and clearing the jams in the mechanism; shopping for 12 guests and crew, 3 shopping trolleys were needed, and doing the laundry. Barry became very unpopular in the launderettes as he took over all of the machines!

**The Ecstasy** – the guests became a sort of family. Many returned over again, and he is in touch with some even now, with Christmas cards and a newsletter. People were also very helpful and kind, and amusing at times. Most guests were over 60 and the oldest was 94. It was also good and safe for singles. One elderly lady surprised him by getting married and then consummating their union on the boat!

It was an entertaining meeting and we learned a lot. I bought a card with a painting of Barry's boats, Conwy & Caernarfon, moored in Stratford, by Gareth Allan.
