

First my apologies to Rosemary Ratcliffe our group leader, this item should have been in last month's newsletter.

We have recently celebrated nine years as a group. 3 of the original members are still going strong. The textbook we use is the Oxford Latin course, there are 3 books to take us to GCSE (O level) standard. The subjunctive (in all its manifestations), the gerund, gerundives and ablative absolute constantly have us reaching for the grammar pages, so this year we will rework our way through book 3.

There would be room for another member if you are reasonably confident in basic Latin, the above list gives you a clue as to what the standard is.

Stratford-upon-Avon u3a meeting - Wednesday 22nd. February 2023 – "Secret Wildlife in my Garden", a talk by Nick Martin.

A group of nearly 60 people enjoyed a fascinating and informative talk, illustrated by stunning photographs. Nick Martin works for the Warwickshire Wildlife Trust and in his spare time is a wildlife photographer. He lives in a fairly urban area but there is a "green" road (an aborted by-pass) running through it. He has a largish garden with a brook running close to it, with a pond, trees and bushes, flower borders and a semi-wild lawn.

The garden has the usual visitors such as birds, insects, butterflies, squirrels, mice and voles etc. A goldcrest, our smallest bird, has made the remaining Leyland Cypress its home. Nick has a nesting box for the robins but they prefer the ivy! "Scarface" is 5 years old, a good age. He has also observed sparrowhawks, red kites, buzzards and even an osprey above.

Nick also has foxes, hedgehogs, frogs, newts and toads, snakes and snails. The pond also attracts dragonflies and damselflies, even a kingfisher. However, to his surprise, he has also attracted ducks from the brook nearby, badgers, a muntjac deer and spraint evidence of an otter! Even more exotic are waxwings, which like the berries, and ring-necked parakeets which have spread from the south of the country to the Midlands!

Nick recommends feeding birds throughout the year as winter can be starvation time. In question time, he discussed the decline of some birds, like sparrows, which can be attributed both to pesticides and to habitat loss. He also noted that some birds, like robins, often fledge before their feathers are completely developed, but they are probably
