#### Report on October meeting: Ruth Smith on VICTORIAN HOUSEKEEPING

Ruth began by telling us of her grandmother who, with her tin trunk at 12 years old was sent into service with a rich lady, to be trained as a cook. Cooks could be notoriously jealous and fearsome. Her employer was often ill and/or pregnant, so it was a chaotic household with servants running out of control. Chaos among the nappy buckets! On the lady's death she opted to train as a seamstress, aware that rich ladies with new dresses were always in need of new stays. But as a maid of all work her duties included lighting the washboiler at 4am and ensuring that clothes were washed, mangled and hanging out to dry by 7am.

Ruth's other grandmother was very bright and keen to become a pupil teacher, but her father insisted on her leaving school at 14 to help him with his milk business, cleaning out the parlours.

Widows too often needed to work as housekeepers to make ends meet: a housekeeper could earn up to £50 a year,

more than the best paid male servants. H G Wells was ashamed of his mother for choosing such a lowly position and wrote that she was the 'worst housekeeper who ever lived'.


For further insights into a range of these lives, we were recommended Tessa Boase's book 'The Housekeeper's Tale: The Women Who Really Ran the English Country House', a lively social history as seen through the eyes of a number of women in service between the mid eighteenth and twentieth centuries. One such worked for an upwardly mobile family who had inherited Erddig Hall and put on up to four charity events weekly. Their housekeeper found herself cooking day after day for up to 170 guests a week, including children and bandsmen. A favourite treat was lark pie! Teas were often set up outside, then involving a great scramble to get inside when the heavens opened.

#### Chaucer

We examined the theory that the difference in characterisation between Troilus and Criseyde could be due to the generic distinction between Mediaeval Romance and something more akin to the modern novel. Whereas Troilus is a typical Romance hero, Criseyde's more flawed and paradoxical persona places her alongside such later heroines as Becky Sharp. EM Forster's definition of fictional characters as 'word masses' led us to explore the relationship between style and genre via Practical Criticism of Kublai Khan and CP Snow's The Masters.


