

Speaker's report for January

The Science of Magic by Brian O' Leary

Brian is a member of the prestigious Magic Circle and has a Bachelor of Science degree, as well as being the current President of the Ilford Magical Society. He performs and entertains regularly for local charities.

Brian explained at the beginning of his talk how in the past magic tricks were often thought to be linked to trickery or conning people but in more recent times people have been investigating the link between magic and the way we see, remember and perceive our world.



He continued to explain how illusions are based on the principles of physics and mathematics and also involve misdirection by creating high and low levels of interest. A magician's job is to get the audience to pay attention to high areas of interest, when secretly the method/trick is carried out in the low area of interest.

Brian then showed us a short clip called the "Monkey Business Illusion" by Simons and Chabris (1999) highlighting unintentional blindness. In this film, we were asked to count how many times the members of one team passed the ball, while ignoring the passes from the other team. While attention was directed towards this task, many of us failed to notice a person in a gorilla costume that walked in beating its chest.

Brian then entertained us with a wide range of magical tricks and illusions, which even knowing that we were being manipulated, we could appreciate his ability to misdirect us using simple psychological science.

Speaker's report for February

The Name on the Bag: 2nd Lt. Clyde R. Simmons. Written and researched by Anne Grimshaw

The eBay listing would have been somewhat unassuming – a photograph of a tatty, rugged looking flight bag with the name of Clyde R. Simmons etched on it. An acquaintance of Anne's bought the bag and so began a search for the identity and history of the bag's owner, who was an American airman from Joplin, Missouri and local old newspapers divulged that Clyde appeared in the lists of high school achievers. Clyde's nephew, Andrew, provided photos and other information. Clyde enlisted in the USAAF in October 1940. Clyde did his training in sunny California and he initially came to Northamptonshire in May 1943 from where he undertook 28 bombing missions. He returned to America for Christmas 1944 and became a flying instructor in South Dakota. January 1945 he returned to the UK and was assigned to 486th Bombardment Group in Station 174, just off the Waldingfield Road, Sudbury. He was killed in an air crash after colliding with another B17 bomber also from Sudbury, whilst flying in a box formation on the 26th April 1945 over Lutton Marsh, Lincolnshire. Clyde's plane crash landed onto farmland killing him and only two crew members survived. The official verdict on the accident report was pilot error. Clyde was buried at the Cambridge American Cemetery and Memorial.
