If you prefer to use the renewal form, then please complete it and post it, or email a scan/screenshot, to me.


It would be very helpful if you could deal with your payment promptly, to avoid effort in following up.

Speaker's report for January



Charlie and the Dig – Charlie Haylock

In this talk Charlie explained how a potential "scam" email from "The Dig" producer, turned out to be real, and was quickly followed by a phone call from Ralph Fiennes. Originally he was engaged to teach Ralph Fiennes how to talk in a Suffolk accent for "The Dig" but the celebrity extended his contract – so he could be the star's personal coach throughout filming.

The film tells the story of how local amateur archaeologist Basil Brown, played by Ralph Fiennes, discovered the Anglo Saxon Royal ship burial at Sutton Hoo. Suffolk Landowner, Edith Pretty employed Basil, an amateur archaeologist, in 1939 to satisfy her suspicions that the numerous mounds on her property had secrets to tell. Charlie spent two days going through the script of "The Dig " and phonetically breaking down the script into the Suffolk dialect and transcribing the phrases into the phrasing used in the area of Sutton Hoo in the 1930's.

Alongside giving us an insight into the complexities of learning the Suffolk accent Charlie described the extreme lengths Ralph Fiennes went to, in his quest to portray the character of Basil Brown. This included continually wearing similar clothes of the amateur archaeologist, riding a bicycle along the small country lanes of Suffolk he would have cycled and visiting the British Museum to see the original notes he made during the excavation of the burial site. Ralph Fiennes also read the book on astronomy written by Basil Brown to help understand the character of the man he was playing. Discovering the great lengths that the actors underwent to make this film authentic and to hear the amusing anecdotes behind the scenes was very entertaining.

However, discovering that Basil Brown left school at twelve and taught himself French, Latin, Spanish, German and Greek, wrote a book on astronomy as well as becoming a world renowned archaeologist was also amazing.

Speaker's report for February

Vicar's son to BBC producer - Charles Garland.

Charles gave us a lively romp through his life from vicar's son to the beginning of his career as a BBC producer.

Charles moved to Hartest, Suffolk when he was 5, where he lived in a large cold draughty vicarage. He told us tales of giving out sherry to visiting clergy, secretly drinking the communion wine and of the housekeeper who only cleaned up to eye level in the house, thus missing all of the high splashes from his muddy boots in the cloakroom!

He thoroughly disliked his school; he did poorly in his academic exams and when he told his headmaster he wanted to go to Drama school, was told no such thing existed! He left and promptly received a grant of £25.00 to go to drama school!



He taught himself to play the piano, and supplemented his income by playing at a variety of places such as ladies keep-fit classes, pubs and restaurants.

He got small parts in the theatre which paid badly. He thought he ought to learn how to read music so decided to join the army. He applied to the Blues and Royals but was rejected because he was too short at 5ft 5¾". He finally got into the Royal Hussars.

After leaving the army he thought he ought to have a permanent job and he wrote to the BBC for one. They said: "no" so he kept writing!

Finally, they invited him to come to Television Centre, though they said there was no job for him and he was too old. He said: "Would you give me five minutes to tell you some of the things I can do? If the Dean of Salisbury came in, would you know how to address him? Do you know how to make a Hollandaise sauce? Do you know what a pirouette fouetté is? Can you put a spring back into a flute? I'd be very useful to you."

Three months later the phone rang. "Can you read a score?" Dr Jonathan Miller needed an assistant for his brand-new production of Così Fan Tutte. It was only for three months, but Jonathan asked them to give him a permanent job.

He worked on Blue Peter, and in science, drama, dance, ballet, opera, comedies, five big variety shows, and five series of 'Allo Allo!' and, of course, 'Dad's Army'.

Charles' overriding message to us all was: "follow your dream".
