Transport to the Rugby Club for Speakers' Meetings

Speaker's Reports for May and June

The Essex Scrubber



Christine Beedle MBE is an Essex cleaner and proud to be so. That is what she told us during an inspirational and entertaining talk detailing the formation of her cleaning business, through to penning a trilogy of books as a testimony to her colourful story.


It was a case of needs must after tragedy struck and her husband became terminally ill with cancer. With two young children and a mortgage to pay, she formed Monthind in 1975 with a £2,000 loan and set up her first major cleaning contract with Willis Corroon in Ipswich.

This was followed by other leading companies in the area, and when a new contract was won Christine was not adverse to donning overalls and doing some shifts to investigate the territory and staff. She realised there were many dedicated members of staff and saw to it that there was steady promotion through the company that highlighted her philosophy that a company's strength is its workpeople. In 2000, when she sold the company, 800 of the 850 staff were women.

Her success didn't go unnoticed by the establishment. In 1992 she was voted East Anglian Businesswoman of the Year and won the Women into Business Award, presented by Kenneth Clarke, in 1995. An MBE followed in 1998 for Services to the Cleaning Industry, presented by the Queen.

Never one to let the dust settle, her first book *The Essex Scrubber – Keeping it clean* was published in 2014, followed by *The Essex Scrubber – Down on her knees.* Her remaining volume is now in the pipeline and due to be published soon.

Theobalds: England's Lost Royal Palace

Theobalds; "rose and disappeared in fourscore years and ten".

Sir William Cecil, who rose to Lord Treasurer in Queen Elizabeth's household, was instrumental in having Theobalds built. He wanted a residence near London, but not too near! He purchased the manor of Theobalds in Hertfordshire in 1564, spending many years and plenty of

money enlarging it and making it very grand.

The exteriors of grand houses were very important to the Elizabethans with plenty of arches and columns to impress the passer-by. Stephen gave us a "3D fly-through reconstruction" of what Theobalds would have looked like at this time.

Theobalds is thought to have been similar in design to Hatfield House; there is only one surviving exterior illustration, produced in 1653, and only one interior illustration dated 1635.

Elizabethans saw gardens as "nature tamed by architectural design". Consequently, their gardens were very geometrical, as can be seen in the existence of nine knot gardens at Theobalds. The garden consisted of seven acres of land featuring fountains, columns and pyramids in stone and wood plus a Venusberg (a viewing platform).

Elizabeth 1 was a very thrifty monarch who liked to travel around the country staying at fine homes, all at the expense of the owners! She came to Theobalds at least 11 times and sometimes stayed for three weeks. Of course, this meant that the accommodation had to be very sumptuous, with rooms for courtiers, ambassadors and many more.

In 1598 Lord Burleigh died and the house passed to his son Robert Cecil. In 1607 Theobalds was given to James 1 who spent a lot of time there following his favourite pursuit: hunting. James spent a lot of money enclosing the land with a huge wall. (Is this where Donald Trump got his idea?)

Theobalds was stripped of valuables by soldiers during the Civil War, and in 1666 the dilapidated house was given to The Earl of Portland.

Stephen's talk finished here, but he has another talk taking us further into the history of the palace.

Wine Group 1

Puglia Wine Experience

Seven members of Wine group One, departed from Sudbury at 3.15am heading for Stansted for a 6.20 flight to Brindisi. There we were met by our guide who drove us to Ostuni for a brief tour of the town. After this we had a three course lunch with our first tasting of the unique Puglian wines.

After lunch we were taken to our hotel in Cisternino which would be our base for the next three days. The hotel was a converted estate consisting of renovated Trullis, the archetypical Puglian houses with peculiar classic coned roofs.

The following day we had three tastings, including lunch. The signature grape of the area is red Primitivo. However, we were pleasantly surprised to find unusual white wines, for example Fiano, Verdea and Minutolo.

The area also produces wine from the more well-known grapes such as Chardonnay and Pino Noir, and many blends with great complexity

Puglia is a fascinating area with almost no high rise building (I think the highest we saw was six storeys), picturesque towns and villages, interesting architecture, wonderful churches and cathedrals, large and small vineyards and huge plantations of olive trees, some up to a thousand years old.

The next day we visited a wine museum and had a tasting lunch followed by a tour of Brindisi.

We were all looking forward to the next day and attending a cookery class, where we would make all our own dishes in the Apulian tradition and later sit down together to enjoy the results of our hard work. The menu consisted of a pasta which we made from semolina flour and

water and, after kneading studiously, shaped into the Orechiette (little ears). Then came the medley of vegetables, a Parmigiana and finally the tiramisu. This, all accompanied by an inexhaustible supply of the local wines.

Following our busy days of wine tastings we had decided to finish our tour with a couple of days relaxing by the sea at Polignano a Mare, a small town on the Adriatic coast.

Then it was back to Stansted, with great memories of an enjoyable and interesting tour.
