Speaker's report for November



Charles Garland: Dad's Army - the nation's favourite comedy

Charles gave us an interesting and funny insight into behind the scenes of this favourite programme. Charles worked with Dad's Army creators Jimmy Perry and David Croft for over 35 years.

It was written by Jimmy Perry and David Croft, and originally broadcast on the BBC from 1968 to 1977. It ran for nine series and 80 episodes (although three

episodes are still missing because in the 60s and 70s the BBC often wiped over tapes so that they could re-use them as tapes were expensive!). A feature film was released in 1971, also a stage show and a radio version based on the television scripts. The series regularly gained audiences of 18 million viewers.

Originally intended to be called *The Fighting Tigers*, *Dad's Army* was based partly on co-writer and creator Jimmy Perry's experiences in the Home Guard.

There are 7seven principal characters, Jimmy Perry called them *The Magnificent Seven*.

Arthur Lowe as Captain Mainwaring was dismissed initially as he was an ITV actor not a BBC actor. Michael Mills gave in under pressure.

John Le Mesurier who played Sergeant Wilson wasn't sure at first as he was a ladies' man and preferred working with women. The cast is mostly made up of men. He said he would "think about it".

Clive Dunn, Corporal Jones, wasn't the first choice for the part as he was only 37. Jack Haig from "Allo Allo" turned it down, so it was given to Clive because he was such a fine character actor.

John Laurie, who played Private Frazer ("We're doomed, we're doomed!") was a great Shakespearean actor. He had a sort of love-hate relationship with the show' as, despite earning him a lot a money, he felt that a sitcom was beneath him.

Arthur Ridley, Private Godfrey. He was thrilled with the part and said it changed his life. He also wrote over 50 plays, "The Ghost Train" being the most famous.

lan Lavender, Private Pike, was the youngest actor at 23. When the show finally came to an end he asked David Croft: "Was Sergeant Wilson really my dad?"

James Beck, Private Walker, was the part Jimmy Perry originally wrote for himself.

Frank Williams, Reverend Timothy Farthing, now aged 90. He had played a lot of church roles and was actually a member of the General Synod.

I have only managed to capture a small portion of Charles' talk but space dictates and I leave you with some of the catchphrases:

"You stupid boy."
"Don't panic!"
"Put that light out!"
"They don't like it up 'em!"
