## **Group News**

### Writing Group – from Lorraine Wilson

Our group meets on the first MONDAY of each month at 2 p.m in one of the member's homes. We write prose, poetry, fiction and non fiction / serious pieces, autobiographical accounts and some for fun. We choose a few topics each month, write our piece then listen to each others work at the meeting. We are a friendly and relaxed group. You are welcome to come along and see if you would like to join us.

Here is a sample of our work – entitled **The Photograph** – by Lorraine Wilson

"It is a small, square black and white photograph of a young man. It was taken in a studio as you can see from the cloudy sky backdrop. It's a head and shoulders photograph. You can see dark hair and brows and a fresh complexion. The subject is wearing army uniform. I had to do some research to find that the cap he is wearing is called a field service cap, shortened to F.S. It has a badge which is just out of sight and is decorated with brass buttons. The uniform is called Battledress and is brown khaki in colour. The tunic and trousers are made of woollen serge. I read that wool was chosen as a material because it is resistant to fire.

On the reverse of the photo is a date, 6 Jun 1942, so it's the middle of the second world war. No one knew it then but exactly two years to the date the amazing seaborne invasion of France would begin. This young man would play his part in the Normandy campaign. Checking what was happening on the 6<sup>th</sup> June 1942 in the different theatres of war I found that mainly the action was in the far east where Japan had captured Singapore in the February, and in North Africa where the Germans under Rommel were in the ascendancy.

On the reverse of the photo is the word 'DAD' written in a child's handwriting. It is my handwriting because the young man is my father.

I don't know where this photo was taken. Was it in a studio in Cardiff not far from his home? Or in a town somewhere in England where his unit was stationed? Maybe it was organised by his army corps which was REME, the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers.

I know very little about my father's army career but I do know that he was 'called up' on his 18<sup>th</sup> birthday, June 22<sup>nd</sup> 1941. A letter arrived that morning telling him to report immediately to Chepstow Barracks as he was being conscripted into the British Army. The war had started almost two years previously and it didn't look likely to end in the foreseeable future. What a change for a young man who had lived most of his life in a fairly isolated house on Caerphilly mountain.

I have now found out that Beachley Barracks in Chepstow was the home of the Army Technical School. So it was there that he was educated as a mechanic and to operate heavy plant while also undertaking military training. I know that he learned to drive, and drove a scammel lorry during the war. I think I was told that he went to a garrison in Nottinghamshire at some stage but for the next three years after his conscription he moved around the country with his unit. He was part of a light ack- ack searchlight battery workshop attached to the Royal Artillery. The unit moved to the South Coast of England in early 1944 in preparation for the invasion. In the 1970's when I was living in Hampshire my father was interested to visit Lee on Solent where he said he was based prior to sailing for France. That's a story for another day perhaps.

So Glyn, that was his name, was almost 19 when this photo was taken. He looks younger it seems to me. He was destined to stay a soldier or craftsman as was his rank in REME for another four and a half years. What fearful frightening sights he would see during his time in France, Belgium and Germany. But there would be camaraderie, friendship and good times too.

My father told me many years later that the army had made him. Indeed, he lived at a momentous and challenging time for our country and our world. I am very proud of his service and his part in defeating the Nazi evil."

# **Community News**

### **Latest warnings from South Wales Listens**

#### **Mobile Phone Upgrade Scam**

Criminals are cold calling people, claiming to be telephone service providers and offering mobile phone upgrades for cheap monthly contracts.

These monthly contracts do not exist but criminals are convincing victims to make a purchase and then asking for their personal and financial details. Once they have this information, the scammers are then using it to contact a genuine phone provider and order a new mobile phone handset using the details given but a different phone to that which was requested by the victim.

Once the phone has been delivered to the victim's address, the criminals will then contact the victim and state that the wrong phone has been delivered and will then arrange to collect and take it back. However, it is all a Scam. Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, then it is.

Never give out your personal information to a third party if you are called unexpectedly. Do not respond to offers from unsolicited calls and carry out your own research and only contact legitimate phone providers for upgrades.

#### **Police Impersonation Scam**

The police have received reports of residents being contacted by a criminal impersonating a Police Officer, stating that they were from Hammersmith Police Station, London.

They stated that the victim had 5 outstanding warrants and unless they paid £5000, that they would be arrested and taken to Prison. So convincing were the criminals that the victim paid part of the amount requested.

The Police will never contact you like this requesting that you pay money to avoid arrest either via bank transfer or gift cards or for money to be collected by a courier. If you get a call like this and are unsure, then STOP. Get their details and then call 159 for your Banks Fraud Department or 101 for the Police but using a different telephone to the one that you were originally called on.

If you do not have a different telephone to hand, then wait 5 minutes and ring a family member or friend to ensure the line has been disconnected. If you are contacted by someone claiming to be from your bank. STOP, HANG UP and Dial 159 to check If they are genuine. 159 is the new hotline designed to fight fraud. No company will ever ask for your bank details over the phone.

If you think that you may have been a victim of these or any other type of scam, then contact your Bank immediately, which you can do by calling 159 and report it to Action Fraud at www.actionfraud.police.uk or call 0300 123 2040.

#### **STOP NUISANCE CALLS**

Tired of nuisance calls ruining your day? Worried you or someone you care for may fall for a scam? The following information may help you. Most major landline phone providers offer a free service to reduce the number of nuisance calls that you receive.

Register for FREE with the Telephone Preference Service (TPS). Call 0345 070 0707 or go to their website <u>Telephone Preference Service (tpsonline.org.uk)</u> If you are asked to pay, refuse and contact TPS direct. TPS can only block UK based companies making unsolicited sales and marketing calls.

Protect your telephone number by asking companies to NOT USE it for marketing purposes, or to pass it on to third parties. If a company calls you, ask them to remove your details from their call list.


