Speakers

This month's talk was 'The Balloon Girl' - a local tragedy.

When in 1896 you are 14, you have been passed from one family to another and have no settled home, how do you survive? At Sully u3a's July meeting, Rosemary Challoner, author of 'The Balloon Girl', told of the unusual decision of one such young girl. It was a decision that proved to be quite the opposite of a means to survive.

Born in Bristol in 1881 to a mother who couldn't, or wouldn't, provide for her, Louisa Maud Evans was given away as a baby to a local couple, William and Mary Crink. All seemed well as the child grew, but some time after she left school the Crinks chose to offer her as a domestic helper to the wife of William Hancock, a West country fairground owner. It was an itinerant life, and at fourteen Louisa found herself at a fair in Truro. There she witnessed the new spectacle of hot air ballooning, in which 'aeronauts' would hang from a trapeze below a balloon and, from five to six thousand feet up, would parachute down to earth, to the thrill of the crowd below. Here was excitement, danger and, to Louisa's eyes, glamour. She was entranced, and eagerly volunteered to look after the balloons of the French balloonist Auguste Gaudron. She had chosen her path.

A short while later, Louisa was with Gaudron again, now in Cardiff. He was there to provide displays of balloon flight at the spectacular and prestigious 'Fine Arts, Industrial and Maritime Exhibition' held in what is now Alexandra Gardens in Cardiff's Civic Centre. The exhibition,

designed to showcase the industry of South Wales, and meant to rival the earlier Crystal Palace Exhibition, was to last five months. It promised a new lake and canal, an overhead railway and a variety of entertainment, a highlight of which would be Monsieur Gaudron's balloon flights. The advertised 'Mademoiselle Albertina', daring lady aeronaut, was none other than Louisa.

She had achieved her dream. Glamour and fame awaited. But it was not to be. At 7.30pm on Tuesday 21 July 1896, the still fourteen year old Louisa clung to her trapeze and rose into the air to cheers from huge crowds. She rose and rose.... and rose again, much higher and further out than the intended bale-out point — until she was a tiny speck heading for the Bristol Channel. At great height, and long after she should have ejected, she was seen leaving the balloon. Possibly having lost consciousness by now, she would likely have known nothing of the descent, or felt the final dramatic splash into the water, where the parachute covered her body and pulled her down. She was found several days later washed up on the shore at Nash, near Newport.

Thousands were in shock, the Cardiff exhibition's committee was censured, and there were questions to be answered - about the girl's age, her previous lack of experience, and the mystery of the parachute, firmly clipped to her clothing on ascent, but missing from the dead body. The following year the law was changed to ensure that no girl under 18, or boy under 16, could be allowed to take part in 'dangerous performances". But it was too late for the girl who lies in Cathays Cemetery.
