## SWIG 1 Group Friday January 26th 2024

Our First meeting in this New Year was hosted by Jim. His theme was Aged Wines and Wines bought at Auction! Fay was not with us as she was on holiday. We missed you Fay.

Jim explained that when buying at auction there is always the risk that the wine will not be good depending on how it's been looked after and stored. Jim made his bids online and therefore did not get to examine the bottles at all. This made our anticipation all the more great.

Our first tasting was a Champagne, Louis Bernard Champagne N/V Epernay France. This well established champagne made by Chanoine Freres had unfortunately not been stored well and had started to oxidise. It was still drinkable but had a yellowish colour. It scored a 6/10. This had a guide price at Auction of £24-30. Jim paid £12.

Our next tasting was a Prestige Calvet 2010 Merlot Cabernet Sauvignon from Bordeaux. Cliff had a 2023 vintage chart regarding wines and the year they were made and told us that this was classed as an exceptional year for this wine. Meaning all growing conditions had been really good. This wine from the Bordeaux region of South West France was well met and scored a7/10. With an estimated Auction price of £18, Jim paid £9.

Our next wine was Chareau La Tour de Mons 1979 Margaux, again from the Bordeaux region. This wine is grown in a single block vineyard surrounded by a wall, which is unusual. This vintage has been performing better than was expected. Unfortunately for us this too had not been stored well and was brownish in colour and slightly oxidised, which was very disappointing. It scored a 5/10. Jim paid £13.00. However it can be found on internet sites at around £60.

Our final wine was one that Jim had been keeping for some time. We were privileged that he decided to share it with us. The wine, Amarone della Valpolicella 2011 was made on the family estate of San Cassiano located in the Italian province of Veneto in the famous Valpolicella region. Jim had lots of wonderful tales to relate about his experiences when visiting this vineyard, and the current owner.

This scored a resounding 9/10 and everyone agreed it was indeed a real treat.

Jim provided excellent cheese and biscuits etc to accompany the wines. Our thanks to him for an interesting evening. Not sure any of us are brave enough to buy at Auction just yet!!

We finished the evening sampling a favourite wine of Paul's called Jammy Red Roo and also a liquor that Paul had made. He had previously that day attended the "Beer Wine & Bus Pass" interest group and so he could be forgiven for not recalling exactly what was in the liquor !! Apparently it was delicious. I was driving so had to decline.

All in All it was a very good evening and we all learnt lots.

Our Next meeting is on Friday February 23<sup>rd</sup>, when Frank will be hosting.
