## SWIG 1 Meeting News Letter Report - Friday 25<sup>th</sup> August 2023

Our August meeting was hosted by Cliff. His theme was wines from Bordeaux.

All the Wines were bought from the Wine Society on an offer and Cliff averaged out the cost of the wines over the box he received.

Our first tasting was Chateaux Thieuley, Blanc 2022 which was an excellent white blend of Semillon, Sauvignon blanc and Sauvignon gris. It was described as having an appealing weight with some fat and oiliness but balanced by creamy citrus. We all enjoyed it and didn't find any "oiliness" !! This cost £10.95 and was 12.5% by vol. It scored a very good 8/10.

Our second bottle was Chateaux Constant Lesquireau, Haut-Medoc 2018. This was a medium bodied Merlot-Cabernet franc blend with red berry aromas. It was 13% by vol and cost £8.95. It scored a 7/10.

Our next bottle was Chateau Pey La Tour Bordeaux superior 2018. This excellent red at <u>15% by volume</u> and gave us aromas of red plum, raspberry, violet, black pepper, leather, vanilla and oak !! It was a full bodied quality wine and scored a resounding 9/10. At £10. This one was difficult not to try again!!

Our last red wine was Chateaux D'Arsac, Margaux 2016 Cru Bourgeois. This was a medium bodied ready to go, early drinking, earthy, red currant filled charmer! Again another well received wine and this again scored a 9/10 with someone scoring it a 10! At £10 and being 13% by vol.

Everyone agreed that Cliff's choices had been very successful. The cheese & biscuits were very well received (along with bread, pate etc!!). Many thanks to Cliff for another great evening.

Cliff produced a quiz which he was sure would stretch Jim and I think he achieved this even though Jim did win with Fay coming second. The rest of us were sadly also rans!!

Our next meeting is on Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> September at 6.30 and Fay will Host again at Pauls "Man Cave". Cheers
