



Geography Group

The first gathering of the Geography group was held on Friday 20th October – hosted by David & Penny Collins. There were 7 at the first meeting, good turnout – all had researched a different aspect of a selected country. The categories that can be covered are:

Population & Topography / Rivers & Waterways / Flora & Fauna / Climate Economy & Industry / Culture & Cuisine / Sport / 20th Century History / Politics / Music The group shared their research on France – this included the economic and industrial make up of this major European country – a country that is still heavily dominated by agriculture – especially the wine industry. Rivers and waterways were explored – which included the extensive canal networks across France, which are mainly used for tourism and leisure, but have been vital for industries in the past. Population comparisons were made with other European countries. The topography of the country is diverse and varied . From Mountains, Beaches, Lowland agricultural areas, and high-level industrial towns – which all influences the climate differences from North to South and East to West. Flora and Fauna was compared to that of the UK – of which many species of trees and shrubs are similar. France was dramatically affected by major historical events in the first half of the 20th century – 2 world wars fought on their soil – many working age men killed in both theatres of war. Vast parts of north France were devastated in 1914-18 and 1939-45 – all requiring rebuilding. France's Empire – colonies acquired and lost across the world were acknowledged – despite most now independent since the start of the 5th Republic constitution in 1959. We of course also discussed the vast selection of wines and spirits produced and the lovely food that it accompanies. A lovely cuppa and biscuits were enjoyed by all – and the next subject country was confirmed, and





Digging4cake gardening group are welcoming in **Spring 2024** with a trip **to Thriplow Daffodil Festival and Country Craft Fair - Sunday 17 March 2024** We have booked a 49-seater coach to visit the festival, which is being held, at a time capsule of a village, in Cambridgeshire









The village closes itself, each year to traffic and the whole village puts on a flower show and a country craft fair. There are blacksmith demonstrations, classic cars and motorbikes, steam engines, stationary engines, military re-enactors, heavy horses, Morris dancers, tractor rides, food stalls, a local pub and much more.



Our two coach pickup points will be as usual at the bus stops, at rear of Asda Swanley and on Hextable Village Green. Although final cost will be dependent on numbers, we have costed it to be approximately £20 per person.

The entrance fee to the Thriplow festival is £7, however if we get a full coach on this trip, we will include the entrance fee within the £20 per person cost. As always, we do not intend to make a profit and the whole trip will be provided at cost.



Unfortunately, no food or drink can be included in this trip and members are asked to make their own arrangements, i.e., packed lunches, picnics, or of course you can purchase food at the festival or the local village pub.



Phil Saunders will be taking names of anyone interested in joining us on this trip, at the next U3A meeting on Friday 3rd November.

A deposit of £10 per head will be required to finally secure your place and this will be collected at the following U3A meeting on Friday 1st

December, or by no later than the 5th December 2023, when the list will close. (Details in Decembers newsletter)


Photography Group

London Off the Beaten Track Walk from Shoreditch Station to Hoxton Station

The London Walkers set off on a sunny day on 10th October to explore those parts of London that tourists don't normally go to. What they are missing! The back streets of the East End may lack the grandeur of the West End and the traditional sights of London, but there are still fine buildings to be seen and a strong sense of the "peoples" history.

We alighted at Shoreditch High Street station, which was originally a rural area outside the City walls, to be confronted by a fascinating display of street art (or graffiti to others) adorning the Braithwaite Viaduct, one of oldest railway structures in the world and neighbouring buildings.

Being outside of the control of the City of London, Shoreditch allowed the building of theatres in the 16th century. The plainly named "The Theatre" opened in 1576 as the first permanent playhouse in England where Shakespeare, Ben Johnson and the Lord Chamberlain's Men trod the boards followed by the opening of "The Curtain" theatre the following year. Of interest were the archaeological findings of pottery shards used as tokens for payment at the "box office" Later in the Victorian era the Standard National Theatre opened as one of the largest theatres in London and famous for its spectacular productions and circuses.

The peeling of church bells reminded us of the nursery rhyme "Oranges and Lemons" and the line "when I grow rich say the bells of Shoreditch" as we passed the parish church of St Leonard's where many Elizabethan actors had been buried. Although this church was closed, we were able to visit the St John the Baptist Church where the local vicar enthusiastically showed us the remarkable painted ceiling and talked of the lively local church community and the church's history of philanthropic welfare work.

Other fine public buildings in the area included the Victorian Shoreditch Town Hall and Magistrate's Court, alms-houses, schools, and former workhouses reminding us that in those times, the majority of local residents were very poor.

Hoxton was also a place of entertainment at the Britannia Theatre and in its pleasure gardens and had fashionable residential squares as well as a number of lunatic asylums and institutes for the destitute. Before WW2 Hoxton was famous as the woodworking district of London making fine furniture along with a lot of faked antique work for unwary buyers!

Our walk concluded at the Geffre alms-houses named after an English merchant whose fortune derived from the slave trade, that is now converted into the Museum of the Home.

Shoreditch and Hoxton History Walk

There were many theatres in that area, and we learnt that the term "box office" derived from when ticket money was collected at the door and put in a ceramic box; afterwards being taken to an office where the box was smashed to retrieve the cash. Hence known thereafter as the "box office". We saw many churches including the famous Shoreditch church (of oranges and lemons rhyme fame). It was surprising to hear how many philanthropic people there were in the 18th /19th centuries who supported charitable establishments, especially schools and hospitals. We ended our walk at Hoxton. Thank you to Alan and John for a lovely day.
