#### **Group News**

#### **Antiques and Collectables Group**

This month we decided to bring items which were either made of Wood or Metal. As always, the group brought along a wide range of interesting objects. Audrey showed us a lovely tin Mobo 'Bronco' horse which she had as a child. It has been in her shed for some time, so is rather rusty, but still charming. She recently purchased a similar horse in better condition for her grandchildren to use. The factory that produced these was based in Erith until 1972, D. Sebel & Co.

Judy brought along a Shillelagh which she had purchased when in Ireland for a wedding. This has a hollow head which has been filled with lead. Shillelaghs were used as walking sticks but could also be brandished as a weapon if the occasion arose. It is made of Blackthorn wood.

Madeline has a pretty music box with a secret opening mechanism. This belonged to her mother. Inside was a very small box with a roll top lid. As a contrast, she also brought along a competition medal for marksmanship, dated 1929. This was issued by the Royal Grammar School in Guildford, which probably had a Cadet Corps for training potential army officers.

John has a collection of trench art which he had polished up before bringing them along. They were made during and after the war by people who found discarded shell cases and turned them into decorative objects. These include a lighter, a letter opener, a vase, and a planter.

Tony surprised us by bringing a box of tools he made in the 1950s when he was undertaking an engineering apprenticeship at Vickers in Crayford. Some of them were engraved with his name, so he could keep track of them in the factory.

Tim had also polished his item – a beautiful copper bottle, with beaten sides. He doesn't know much about its origin or use, but we agreed that it is a lovely thing. He also had some old coins – some British half-crowns from 1836 and 1837, and one from West Africa from 1936 with the head of Edward VIII. This is unusual as very few were made.

Penny purchased a delightful Royal Doulton dish at the recent Finders Keepers outing. It has a garden design showing a gardener coming through the gate with a scythe. The dish dates from between 1934 and 1950.

Sue proudly displayed her family teapot, which was probably a wedding present in 1935 for her husband's parents. This is made of pewter and has a bone handle. It was made between 1925 and 1935 by Robert Pringle and Sons, who were London jewellers based in Clerkenwell from the 19th century until the 1960s.

Wendy brought along two items – a small Chinese tea scoop with a dragon's head, from a trip to Faversham, and a folding fruit bowl with a locking handle, which she bought in Canada in 1991.







Dave's large Beswick Royal Doulton drinking vessel, which he found on the Finders Keepers trip, was called 'an antique of the future' by our expert on the day. The tankard was made in 1976 and depicts the 'Ghost of Christmas Present' from Charles Dickens 'A Christmas Carol'. Different designs were issued each year from 1971 to 1982.

I contributed three things. I have a small arts and crafts photo frame, and a wooden shoe stretcher, both bought on a recent visit to Suffolk. I also have a tiny Huntley and Palmers tin, which was used for biscuit samples.

Birds seen included Chaffinch, Goldfinch, Common Gull, Tufted Duck, Lapwing, Black Headed Gull, Oyster Catcher; and a few more too distant to identify accurately. Heard but not seen were Great Tit and Robin.



We came across a rather large borrow in the centre of the path we were walking on which could have easily caused a mishap for the unwary birdwatcher; it being easily large enough to accommodate a booted foot and leg if stepped into. We mused that it could have been the abode of the legendary Cliffe Pools 'Lurking Leg Biter' and then decided to head to the Six Bells pub in Cliffe village for lunch as the fresh blustery wind had given us an appetite.
