News from the Groups

Antiques and Collectables Group

Our antiques meeting began this time with a mystery object from Judy that she had found in her father's possessions. It was a small brass cylinder with a lens inside. Nobody had a clue, but Judy's son had done some research and found out that it was a Pocket Spectroscope, made by William Ladd and Co of London, probably around 1867. Apparently, this is a device that measures the spectrum of light – to be honest I'm still not sure what it does or why, but a nice tactile thing!

Chrissy is moving house and whilst de-cluttering, had come across some interesting books. One of these was an 1863 Garden Manual published by those involved in the weekly periodical – The Cottage Gardener. This is a small book packed with useful tips about every aspect of gardening. It covers mulching, composting, pruning, trenching, top-dressing, hotbedding, crop rotation, how to design and set out your garden, and information about many types of plant. All still very useful.



Tim brought along a pack of cards advertising Capstan Navy Cut cigarettes – 'Made to make friends. He also showed us some old pennies from the 19th Century. This included some large heavy copper pennies which were phased out from the 1850s when a smaller, lighter bronze version was introduced. Queen Victoria's 'bun' penny was issued until 1894, so called because of her hairstyle. This small collection included images of several different monarchs – Queen Victoria, King William IV, and King George VI. Since the introduction of decimalisation in 1971, new coins have only depicted one monarch – now about to change when King Charles III coins are minted. He will face to the left, as tradition requires alternate positions for each new monarch.

Wendy showed us a small part of her Minton Versailles patterned tea set – this style was made between 1966 and 1979. She found it at a boot fair for £20. She doesn't use it but keeps it on display in a cabinet. The Minton factory was established way back in 1793 and was a very successful family-run business in Stoke on Trent, Staffordshire for many years. After WW2, interest in Staffordshire pottery declined, and the company eventually merged with Royal Doulton.





Aft er his father died, Tony came across a letter signed by George V1, commending his father Reginald for serving in the Home Guard. He was a firearms instructor. There is an interesting photograph of his father and others practising how to march – unusually, they carried sub-machine guns hung from their waists. These were made in the US in WWI but were not used, so the US government donated them to Britain.

I found some small card discs at an antique fair and discovered that they were used as caps

for early milk bottles. Originally, from 1880s, milk bottles had porcelain stoppers held on by wire. With a growing awareness of hygiene issues and the spread of disease, cardboard tops were introduced to keep out flies, and to keep the milk airtight. Dairies used them to promote their business. Children collected the caps to play games such as Pogs or Tazos. This became so popular that long after the foil milk bottle tops were introduced in the 1950s, caps were still made specifically for use in games.



John and I recently visited Portugal and were very taken with the old ceramic tiles seen on the buildings around the cities of Lisbon and Porto. They are known as Azulejos, meaning small, polished stone. Introduced by the Moors in the 13th century, they often depict blue and white designs. They were used as decoration on the outside and interiors of public buildings and private houses, and they also provided insulation against the heat. An added advantage was that were easy to clean. We saw magnificent tile murals at the Sao



Bento Railway Station in Porto, and John purchased some old house tiles when he went to the village of Castelo Rodrigo.

Digging For Cake Gardening Group - Garden visit to Knowle Hill Farm 24 August 2022





For our August meeting we visited a beautiful garden at Knowle Hill Farm Ulcombe. It sits 400 ft up on the North Downs overlooking the Kentish Weald and is filled with plants that thrive in warm dry conditions. There was certainly a huge variety.



We were warmly welcomed by Elizabeth, the owner with tea/coffee and of course cake! This was much appreciated as many members had a difficult journey due to road closures.

We were shown round the very large garden that has been divided into areas to be used according to the direction of the sun. Orchard, BBQ area with pond and lawned areas just to name a few.





The owners have been living there for 40 years and have invested in a bore hole to use for the garden. This has been very handy in the recent hot weather.

They started the garden from scratch after most of the large trees were lost in the hurricane of 1987. Although there are still some trees well over a hundred years old. Elizabeth said it is still work in progress, as a garden is always evolving.

It was a great sunny day, enjoyed by all.

"THE HEART OF GRAVESEND" -A HISTORY WALK WITH CHRISTOPH BULL



At the beginning of September nineteen members met outside Gravesend library for a history walk led by Christoph Bull. His knowledge of Gravesend and its history is extensive and was delivered in his usual enthusiastic manner. The library is actually an impressive Carnegie building dating from 1905. It also happens to be Christoph's former place of work. He explained the derivation of the town's name. It has nothing to do with graves! Ask me about the correct story next time you see me. It's

complicated! He told us how 19th century Gravesend had been a busy tourist destination. Visitors arrived in their hundreds by steam boat from London. Many would hire donkeys for a ride to the top of nearby Windmill Hill. The influx of tourists created considerable wealth for the town.



Gravesend has managed to keep many of its old buildings, particularly in the High Street where there are several early 19th century shops. The Old Town Hall was built in 1836. We walked through the market which was established in 1268 and rebuilt in 1898. It boasts a fine statue of Queen Victoria. Christoph had many stories to tell us including the sad tale of Robert Pocock (1760-1830). He was a successful author, historian and publisher who eventually fell on hard times and died penniless. Outside



St. Georges Church is a statue of Pocahontas. She died in the

town at the start of her return journey to North America in 1617. Her true story has little in common with the Disney version.

Our morning walk finished at the Town Pier. This is thought to be the oldest cast iron pier in the world and is a Grade 2 listed building. A regular ferry service will take you across the river to Tilbury. At this point several of us, together with Christoph, enjoyed lunch in the Three Daws pub next to the river. This historic inn has its origins in the 15th century. It was an ideal location to finish our Gravesend walk.



I will endeavour to arrange another history walk with Christoph, probably in the new year.
