# **Outings and Trips**

#### Ashdown Forest and Saint Hill Manor on June 19th

Members of our u3a travelled by coach for a trip to Ashdown Forest including a visit to Saint. Hill Manor. Our first stop was in East Grinstead to pick up Liz, our City and Village guide. She

wasted no time in pointing out the old half-timbered buildings along the High Street with their strangely tiled roofs. We continued or journey through Forest Row to Heaven Farm. A welcome visit here allowed us a quick break for tea and coffee. The rest of the morning was spent touring Ashdown Forest. I have to admit that I had not realised how large the area is. Located between the North and South Downs (we could see both in the distance), it comprises woodland, heath, agricultural





land and several attractive

villages. Our guide was able to entertain and inform us with historical anecdotes and details. of the local wildlife. Perhaps my favourite village was Hartfield. It was once the home of AA. Milne and his son, Christopher Robin. Not surprisingly, it was the inspiration for all of the much loved Winnie the Pooh stories. We paused at the strangely named "Friends Clump" to stretch our legs and admire the views. We returned to Heaven Farm for a ploughman's lunch and a glass of wine (well, for some of us, anyway!)



In the afternoon we visited Saint Hill Manor. We first hear of it in the 16th century when it was called Saynt Hill. The splendid manor house was initially built in 1733 by the Crawford family. It was rebuilt in its present form in 1792 – a fine example of the late Georgian style, using local Sussex sandstone. The house has had several notable owners over the years – Dr. Crookshank, Margaret Biddle (wife of the US Ambassador), the Maharajah of Jaipur and L. Ron Hubbard. The latter lived here and completely refurnished the house in the 1960's. He is best remembered as a prolific author, explorer, educator, photographer and the founder of the Scientology religion. Our local guides gave us a tour of the house. We admired the

furniture and paintings. In his study we even listened to the sounds of a very early mellotron. His desk was just as he left it in 1967 before travelling to the USA. He gave instructions not to move anything stating that he would return. He never did. The visit ended with a cream tea in the bizarrely decorated "monkey room". There was time to explore the grounds – lots of roses and a large lake – before or return journey to Swanley. Many thanks to Penny for organising this fascinating and enjoyable day.

#### **Group News**

#### Birdwatching Group - Birding Visit 21st June. 2023 to Rye Harbour Nature Reserve

The June visit was to Rye Harbour on a warm sunny and slightly windy day where there were many visitors enjoying the reserve. In 2011 the Sussex Wildlife Trust took over the management of the reserve which covers the equivalent of six hundred football pitches of open and low-lying ground. The 'high points' are the crests of shingle storm ridges built up by tides and storms whilst 'low points' are between the ridges where salt marsh has now developed. Changes to the area means that now grazing can now take place.

In May 2021 a newly built visitors centre was opened with wheelchair access and provides educational facilities. information on wildlife and the many plants that grow there, a cafe and a shop. (click on link above to view)

Birds seen during the visit include:-

Common terns, Lesser Black Backed Gulls, Red Shanks,

Cormorants, Whimbrel, Meadow pipits, Crows, Jackdaws, Blackbirds, Black Headed Gulls, Skylarks, Kestrel, Marsh Harriers, Sparrows, Oystercatchers, Avocets, Pied Wagtail and Common Gull.

Jenny gave us a tour of the grounds showing us how the garden had been split into room like areas with shaped hedging, amazing topiary and beautiful Cornus trees covered with pink and white flowers. The roses were in full bloom and looking beautiful.

There was a large pond with a seating area raised above the water where Jenny and her husband gave us tea and cake, and everyone enjoyed a relaxing time.

# A historical walk from Wapping to Shadwell

It was a chilly 1st day of June when Swanley U3A London Walkers set off for Wapping and Shadwell, areas of London on the north bank of the Thames steeped in history and grizzly intrigue, extreme poverty, squalor, prostitution and crime and a place of execution of offenders, as well as being a former busy commercial and shipping centre. In more modern times it has served as the home of Alf Garnet of "Until Death Us Do Part" and as a location

in Del and Rodney's "Only Fools and Horses". Walkers were particularly interested in the famous riverside Prospect of Whitby pub, notorious in the 18th century as a haunt of smugglers, cut-throats and footpads, but also the site where the first fuchsia plant arriving in Britain from South America in 1788 was sold, and frequented by all the usual celebrities from Pepys, Johnson, Dickens and Turner to Princess Margaret.





Moving on, we passed the extensive Shadwell Basin and docks that were in operation until 1969 and now used for water sport activities or filled in to make way for pleasant parkland. Vast warehouses once lined these docks which have now been turned into luxury apartments.

Particularly striking was the enormous vaulted Great Tobacco Dock Warehouse where leaf tobacco from Virginia was stored, but now much underused as a venue for music and

events.





Nearby in the late 19th century had stood Jamrach's Animal Emporium, the largest pet shop in the world, commemorated by a statue of an escaped Bengal tiger and a small boy looking up in awe at him.

It was a pleasure to find Wilton's Music Hall, the oldest surviving Victorian music hall in the country. Despite its dilapidated external appearance, the Hall has been saved from demolition by a Heritage Lottery Fund grant and now regularly puts on theatre productions. Apart from bomb damage during WW2, two other significant battles have occurred in the area.

In 1986 the "Battle of Wapping" marked the scene of industrial protests against Rupert Murdoch's News International group that had acquired the London Dock as a printing works effectively ending Fleet Street's traditional role as the base for British newspapers. Earlier in 1936 Shadwell had been the scene of the Battle of Cable Street between Oswald Mosely's Blackshirt fascists against the people of the East End, commemorated in a huge wall mural and a red plaque. "They shall not pass"!

Our thanks once more to Alan and John for their leadership and detailed research.
