

Ethos and Principles

The Principles of the u3a Movement

The u3a movement is non-religious and nonpolitical and has three main principles:

Lifelong Learning

- Membership of the u3a is open to all those who have retired or are semi-retired.
- Members promote the values of lifelong learning and the positive attributes of belonging to a u3a.
- Members should do all they can to ensure that people wanting to join a u3a can do so.

Self Help Learning Principle

- Members form interest groups covering as wide a range of topics and activities as they desire; by the members, for the members.
- No qualifications are sought or offered. Learning is for its own sake, with enjoyment being the prime motive, not qualifications or awards.
- There is no distinction between the learners and the teachers; they are all u3a members.

The Mutual Aid Principle

- Each u3a is a mutual aid organisation, operationally independent but a member of The Third Age Trust, which requires adherence to the guiding principles of the u3a movement.
- No payments are made to members for services rendered to any u3a.
- Each u3a is self-funded with membership subscriptions and cost kept as low as possible





History

Our founders envisaged a collaborative approach with peers learning from each other. The u3a movement was to be self-funded, with members not working towards qualifications but learning purely for pleasure. There would be no distinction between the learners and the teachers – everyone could take a turn at being both if they wished. From its beginnings in 1981, the movement grew.

1981 The beginning of the movement By the early 1990s, a u3a was opening every fortnight. u3as grew in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland, and in 2008 membership was increasing by 11% every year.

2010 Membership reached the quarter million mark.

2016 The u3a movement reached the milestone of 1,000 u3as, celebrated by a conference and one of the speakers included Eric Midwinter, one of the founders of the u3a movement.

Today, our movement includes over 400,000 members in more than 1,000 u3as and continues to grow.
