


Here are some places you can visit, if you know of others then please do let me know.

Science Group

At the meeting on December 6th the Science Group listened fascinating talk by member Tony Yeates about ITER, the International Thermonuclear Experimental Reactor. This large, long running cooperative venture is based at a site in Provence where scientists and engineers of many counties are working produce reliable. controllable and safe fusion power by fusing two isotopes of hydrogen Deuterium and Tritium. The former is extracted from sea water, and Tritium is manufactured from Lithium. If successful, the heat generated from the plasma created



could power turbines for a fraction of the fuel input now used from conventional sources and create virtually no atmospheric pollution. (1 gram of the Deuterium/Tritium mixture can produce the power output of 11 tons of coal) Given the extremes of heat, cold, hurricanes and floods experienced worldwide this year, the success of this project is desperately needed.

The EU, China, India Japan, Korea the US Switzerland and yes, even Russia, are all collaborating despite the political difficulties. The UK remains an important partner, though Brexit has caused some problems.



At the heart of the project is a 30m by 28m containment vessel, manufactured in India and assembled by German engineers, where highly charged plasma, excited by and controlled by huge, supercooled magnets, releases its power. Complex cooling systems then take this heat and transform it into a manageable steam that could power turbines to produce electricity. At this site however, there are no turbines, for the complex exists to show that the physics and engineering can actually do the job required. Its work is at the cutting edge of scientific knowledge. The problems

that must be overcome are complex and some of the brightest minds pf today are working on it. In Tony's view, its success is vital for the survival of the planet.

The talk was held in the same week as the USA announced that it had finally managed to create a positive fusion power output by a different route, bombarding a small amount of Deuterium and Tritium with immensely powerful lasers. Whatever the outcome and whichever technology succeeds, the world needs a breakthrough that can be transformed into power stations on the ground. A site in Nottinghamshire has been earmarked for the first, small-scale plant when the technology advances sufficiently to make this a viable concern.

morning sunshine, that all thoughts of the cold were forgotten.




The pathways were reasonable with only occasional slippery patches. It was a delight climbing up and down the Peckforton hills, savouring the good company and the panoramic views.
