Date - May 17th


Pick-ups – 1.15 pm from Tarporley and 1.30pm from Kelsall

On April 15 some of the u3a Art Appreciation Group enjoyed a visit to Carden Park Sculpture Garden to be shown round the new sculptures on show by Emma Rodgers from the Wirral. Our guide was Grant Ford, a leading specialist in the art world, who regularly appears on the Antiques Road Show and will be talking to the u3a at the meeting 25 May. We all enjoyed learning about the sculptures and later Emma gave a demonstration of how she moulds details of her work.


Our normal Tarporley meetings are in the Craven Room at 10 till 11.30 on the 2nd Tuesday of the month.

#### **Book Group 1**

Jodi Piccoult is a number one American Author who has written 28 novels and Jennifer Finley Boyland is a bestselling author, transgender activist, Professor at Barnard College and a contributing opinion writer for the New York Times. The book was chosen by a member who attended the Chester Literature Festival last autumn where Jodie Piccoult and Jennifer Finley Boyland had discussed their latest book.



Mad Honey has a slightly bitter taste and has been produced by bees who feed on the pollen of rhododendron flowers. Ingesting this honey, depending on the amount taken, can cause hallucinations, a slower heartbeat, temporary paralysis or unconsciousness.

Oliivia McAfee is a professional beekeeper and single mother who moved to New Hampshire with her young son Asher. They left Boston where Olivia was the victim of abuse by her charming and successful husband. The murder of teenager, Lily Campinollo throws the lives of those in the community into disarray, bringing secrets into the public domain and causing relationships to be questioned, dissected and doubted.

The story highlights current issues which are both intriguing and unsettling and is told by the main protagonists from their prospective and sets the denouement within a courtroom backdrop. The Group felt that the two authors had their own styles which did not always fit seamlessly together. However, the plot did draw the reader in and although some considered the narrative over long, it did produce an enjoyable and provoking novel. There was a lot of reference to bee keeping and bees, which was both interesting and informative and the facts were successfully woven into the narrative. The current issues covered by the book at times felt a bit didactive, but the points made were necessary to the plot and did provoke some lively discussion.

Overall, an enjoyable book.

#### **Book Group 2**

This group discussed the 2017 and Costa First Novel Award, Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine by Gail Honeyman. This gentle but perceptive tale of an ordinary woman and her changing relationship with the world around her, has gained many fans since its publication.








#### **Science Group**

For our April meeting, we continued to explore the world of Artificial Intelligence (AI). This is a major technological development which is likely to have a significant impact on the way we do things. The challenge is to develop AI for our benefit and to limit any harmful impact. The major IT companies, eg Microsoft and Google, are investing heavily in this field and they are now starting to introduce their products to the general public. One of the aspects we covered was the use of ChatBots. These are essentially clever search engines which can give surprisingly detailed answers, and which can even write



essays or poems. Members will no doubt be aware of the Prime Minister's desire to improve our Maths skills. We thought we would test the ChatBots to see if they could solve a GCSE level problem, highlighted in a recent edition of The Times. The problem is:

Amy is one third the age of her mother. In 12 years time, Amy will be half the age of her mother. How old is Amy's mother?

We fed this sentence into 3 systems (Microsoft Bing, OpenAl ChatGPT, and Google Bard). All the systems rose to the challenge and showed us their workings out. 2 systems told us that Amy's mother is 36; the third said 24. Readers might like to check out the answer themselves.

One conclusion, from this trivial test, is that AI may prove to be a very powerful piece of technology but it will have to be used with caution.


