The Lost Flowers of Alice Hart

The story covers a period of 20 years set in Australia, from the sugar cane fields by the coast, to a native Australian flower farm, to the beautiful central desert. It is a story of stories within stories. Each chapter is headed with the name and beautifully executed line drawing of a native flower relating to the content. Alice Hart lives with her parents on a remote homestead and after a disastrous fire that kills her mother and father she is brought up by her grandmother at Thornfield, a native flower farm. The Flowers, women who have sought refuge at the farm some escaping from abusive men, help with Alice. She learns the language of the flowers when it is too difficult to speak. She settles but grows up frustrated how little she knows of her family's story. In her 20's, her life is disturbed when she suffers betrayal and loss. She flees the farm to the central Australian desert where she thinks she has found solace and falls in love with Dylan, a charismatic and dangerous man. There are family secrets and stories that flowers cannot tell, Alice must have the courage to possess the most important story, her own.

The Family Upstairs by Lisa Jewell

The book centres on a family living in Cheyne Walk, London. It tells of the lives of the various members, using the present and retrospective time. It begins with Libby on her 25th birthday, inheriting the family property left in trust to her by her deceased parents.

It unfolds the sometimes horrifying events that have led to this moment in time, and the realisation that she has family with whom she has had no contact whatsoever.

The story becomes very complicated, new characters are introduced, with catastrophic results.

The group was divided in its reaction to the book. For some it was too complicated with too many characters and subplots, plus the jumping back and forth in time was too confusing. A straightforward timeline could have leant more intensity to characters and plot. For others it was an original plot that kept you intrigued to the very end. It was written with short chapters that broke up the narrative, perhaps to create a sense of unease or to act as an impetus to read on. Jo Sampson



Photography – is now the ultimate method to capture and store our memories. Visual reminders are a most powerful method to record and recall - long gone, for most, the day of the written diary. Readily available are the means

to record moments and experiences in our lives, especially with what has become the all-important resource, our mobile phone.

Not all images can excel - this does not mean that they are not important and interesting. They can have powerful meaning, whether artistic, or are the simple 'snap.' No longer the need to search through a tatty old cardboard box from the attic; with so many of those past 'snaps' in black and white. Today's albums, and our stories often sit in the palm of the hand, to be shared at any time.

Moments and instances in time have been captured in photographs for around two centuries. 12.4 trillion photographs have now been taken, with 57000 now captured every second – 5 billion a day - 92.5% using Smartphones - only 7% using cameras. There are 750 billion accessible images on the internet – just 6% of the total – most others. not shared.

In 2030 the number of photographic images that will exist will be 28.6 trillion.

It does make one wonder what could have occupied human minds so much, before photography.

Directions:

From the Parkham village, there is a cross roads with the Bell Inn - EX39 5PL, one side and the school, which is in Melbury road the other side of the cross roads. Turn down Melbury Road, with the School on your left. Follow the road for about 1½ miles, you should pass Melbury Cottage on your left followed by the track to Melbury Farm on your right. Immediately after this is a junction, please take care as you have to 'Give Way' but the signage & road markings are very poor.

At the junction turn right. After about 1¾ miles you should see a road name on your right for Powlers Piece Park. Continue on for about 100 yards to a crossroads. Here turn right signposted Woolsery, Clovelly & Merry Harriers Nursery.

Follow the road for just over ½ mile and on the right you should see a large parking area for Melbury Plantation, this is where the walk will start. FYI the majority of the walk is in the Narracott plantation (which does not have very much parking space).

The group discussed the relative merits of biography and autobiography.

The following books were then presented:

10 minutes 38 seconds in this Strange World by Elif
Shafak - The title refers to the time between the stopping of the heart beat and the end of consciousness of the main character, an Istanbul prostitute, who relives her life story from conception to her murder, featuring her five similarly marginalised friends.

A Room made of Leaves by Kate Grenville - An imaginary memoir of Elizabeth, wife of John Macarthur who introduced the Merino sheep to Australia. In 1789 the couple left North Devon for Sidney where John helped run the penal colony and the pair eventually built up a considerable farming operation.

Jude the Obscure by Thomas Hardy - Poor Jude, where did it all go wrong for the original working class hero? Nothing but problems in work, study and love...and then there were the kids!

Gulliver's Travels by Jonathan Swift - Not the bowdlerised children's book of popular imagination but a bitter and wide sweeping satire on the follies of mankind. Swift claimed he wrote it "to vex the world rather than divert it".

The Covenant of Water by Abraham Verghese - 700 pages plus about a family in Kerala destined to lose one member of each generation to drowning...and Kerala is full of water. Reactions range from "unputdownable" to "rambling and repetitive".

A wide selection of Blues & Rock tracks were presented at January's session. American Blues/Rock group Indigenous - from the Dakota Yankton Indian Reservation kicked off the afternoon with tracks from two of their albums (Vanishing Americans & Time is Coming). Rock perennials The Rolling Stones featured tracks from their first and latest albums with Route 66 from their 1964 album and R S Blues from their 2023 album Hackney Diamonds. Mark Knopfler entertained with On Every street followed by two tracks by George Thorogood - Madison Blues and Bad to the Bone; while another famous bluesman John Lee Hooker was represented with Dimples. Tom Petty appeared in two formats, first with his early band Mudcrutch and the track Lover of the Bayou and then with the better known Heartbreakers with Crawling Back to You. A track from Johnny Winter (Dallas) was then followed by the Band Cowboy, featuring Duane Allman with Please be with Me. The session finished with the track Eye of the Storm from the 2021 album (We will Ride) by the hard rock group Inglorious. In February our session has the theme Influences.

Practical Philosophy

We started 2024 by agreeing on an updated format to use at our meetings that would lift the pressure of producing monthly presentations but retain a clear distinction between us as a philosophy group and a general discussion group. We decided to continue with some presented themes (according to members' motivations) and to mix that with sessions of prepared questions on philosophical themes for discussion. The meeting then tested the idea by responding to several topical questions and the session proved thoroughly enjoyable to all.

First we considered the proposal to remove the statue by Eric Gill from outside the BBC Centre in London on the grounds of the sculptor's immoral lifestyle and that led to the more general question of whether music, art or literature can be separated from the character of its creator. Then we looked briefly at the moral value of animals compared to humans but this unprepared question proved less fruitful and made clear that prior background research on a topic is necessary. Our final question was about the ongoing issue of freedom of speech in US universities and specifically, as currently being argued, whether one should have the freedom in an academic context to present a case for "genocide of the jews". This proved, perhaps unsurprisingly, to generate strong responses but the very fact that we had the discussion went some way towards answering the question. It also led us to consider the question in the context of the ongoing conflict in Gaza and we benefitted greatly from having two group members of jewish heritage, who were

both knowledgeable and open-minded, who were able to clarify historical and other issues related to Israel and its neighbours. They appropriately ended that discussion for us with an "Oy Vay!" Our February meeting reverts to our previous format and will be on the subject of children's' rights.

The Saturday Cinema Club had it's first outing on Sat 6th Jan and went to see 'The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry' at The Plough, Torrington. The film was enjoyed by all with particular appreciation for the acting of Jim Broadbent and Penelope Wilton playing husband and wife who had lost their son to suicide years before .The film had stayed fairly close to the book and , although it felt overlong, we understood why this was necessary to convey the length of the journey on foot from South Devon to Berwick upon Tweed. It felt understated and atmospheric and thought provoking and we could happily have spent much longer discussing it. Recommended. Next outing to be agreed but will be on the first Sat in February.

At our last meeting, David Dickinson entertained us with a fascinating account of the ground-breaking technologies behind the iconic U2 spy-plane, and the international crisis it triggered.

This month, on Tuesday 27th February (2:30pm in the Upper Room), it's new technologies of a more modern kind that take centre stage, as David McLellan tells us about one of the most challenging problems in bioscience; "Unravelling the Three-Dimensional Structures of Proteins". These large, complex molecules are involved in almost every function of living cells, yet, until very recently, their spatial configurations - the key to their versatility - had been resolved for just a handful of the many thousands found in the human body. But today, thanks to advances in artificial intelligence (AI), reliable structural predictions that could take years to formulate using traditional methods, can now be generated literally at the push of a button. David's talk will focus on the background, rapid evolution and consequences of this major scientific breakthrough.
