I hope you managed to have an enjoyable Christmas and that you had the chance to catch up with friends and family over the festive period.





Let's Talk About Books Group contact Peter Flacke

The subject for discussion was "What's so great about the short story?" with the majority verdict being that it is indeed great. The following books were also presented :

War is a Racket by Smedley Butler - More of a pamphlet really, written in 1935, in which the retired US General detailed the ways in which war is good for business with "the profits reckoned in dollars and the losses in lives". He also suggested some ways to "smash the war racket", none of which have yet been taken up.

Surviving Death by Leslie Kean - The journalist, better known for her UFO work, investigates various seemingly paranormal phenomena from reincarnation to mediumship to near-death experiences. The evidence presented is persuasive but tantalisingly inconclusive. Foster by Claire Keegan - A highly regarded novella set in Ireland about a young girl, neglected by her parents, who blossoms when fostered out to kinder relatives. The Book Smugglers of Timbuktu by Charlie English -A detailed account both of European explorers' early attempts to reach Timbuktu, the "fabled Eldorado of Africa", and the efforts made in 2012 to rescue its ancient texts from marauding jihadis.

The Mayor of Casterbridge by Thomas Hardy - The classic tragedy about a man whose final wish is only to be forgotten. Our reader, noting how much attention the one-time architect Hardy paid to the buildings of Casterbridge (in reality Dorchester), posed the question whether a book can be better appreciated with some knowledge of the writer or by relying solely on the text.

Next meeting at 2pm on Monday January 22nd. The topic for discussion will be "Biography or Autobiography?" Got a preference? Bring it along and persuade us!

Some unintended musical links occurred in our December session. For example The Allman Brothers track Blue Sky was played early in the session. Then later we played two tracks - No Reward and Funny Little Tragedy - by the Allmans "side project" Gov't Mule, featuring the guitar and vocals of Warren Haynes . Similarly the Willie Dixon number little Red Rooster was covered by Tom Petty & the Heartbreakers. Meanwhile elsewhere in the session Howlin' Wolf ,who was the first artist to record this blues number in 1961, sang another blues classic Smokestack Lightning. This number had been played in various formats by this Chicago bluesman since the 1930s but was first recorded by the Chess label in 1956. Our varied diet of mainly blues orientated music also include tracks from: Elmore James (Dust my Broom); Janis Joplin (Half Moon); The Blues Band and Albert King & Stevie Ray Vaughan in a 1983 version of Born Under a Bad Sign. One of our regular artists Santana showed up with a track from the Barboletta album and finally the Xmas spirit was amusingly introduced by Bob Dylan with Must be Santa from his 2009 Christmas album.

Our numbers were somewhat reduced by seasonal bugs and commitments but we all got thoroughly involved in the subject of Cyberethics - a branch of applied ethics that examines moral, legal and social interactions at the intersection of computers and communication technologies. We regularly drifted into the growing field of Artificial Intelligence but that area is of such significance to the future of our species that it has now become a subject which is commonly referenced in our meetings. Whilst the need for ethical standards in digital practice was easily agreed, the context in which it should be defined and applied (and by whom) was far less clear. There are cultural, social, political and financial incentives which bias different groups towards different ethical priorities and these are unlikely to be mutually sympathetic. Has one a right to privacy for instance? In a democracy one might be happy to be on an electoral register and to complete a census occasionally but not to have social media collecting and distributing every nuance of your online life. In an authoritarian state however it might be seen as in the interest of its citizens for all information to be shared. Most of the group were surprised to learn that the microphone on one's computer and phone, unless switched off, can be used to collect key words from conversations in their vicinity for feeding to media such as Facebook in order to present you later with related advertisements. This can however be presented as customisation for your personal benefit. We ended with a discursive visit to the Black Web but realised that none of us knew how it could be accessed in real life - so more research is in hand! Stuart

The details are as follows: **On Friday**, **19 January**, meet inside Barnstaple railway station at 9.05am to take the 9.35am train to St David's Station, Exeter. (The cheapest parking is Seven Brethren car park, Barnstaple which is next to the old Leisure Centre (just demolished). It is currently £2.50 for the day and only a 5 or 6 minute walk to Barnstaple Railway Station). The train journey is about one hour and ten minutes. From St David's Station we will walk along the flood basin first and then join the River Exe at the weir where we will stop for our coffee. After our break we will continue on to Exeter Quay. The trains back to Barnstaple are roughly one per hour (2.14pm, 3.14pm and 4.13pm). Lunch is booked for 1.00pm.
