ARCHAEOLOGY



We are a group with a wide-ranging interest in local and national history and archaeology. Members take it in turns to organise a talk one month followed by an outing on the same theme the following month, to sites and museums of interest within a reasonable travelling distance. We use members' cars or Tweed Wheels.

The autumn 2022 focus is on the Romans in the Peebles

area followed by a trip to the Trimontium museum in Melrose. The meetings are held at various venues and every trip includes coffee and lunch as socialising is an essential part of the group's experience.

We generally, but not always, meet on the third Monday of the month depending on where the outing is going. The outings often take most of the day.

ART ACTIVITIES



We meet fortnightly on Tuesdays at 10.30am in the Drill Hall, throughout the year, apart from July and August.

This is a very informal drawing and painting group for all levels and using any medium. This could be watercolour, acrylic, oils or pastels. We produce a

programme with a suggested subject for each session. This is, nevertheless, optional.

ART APPRECIATION



In this group we use the umbrella term ART to encompass Painting, Architecture, Photography, Sculpture, Interior design and Textile design etc. In other words Art in all its forms.

The social aspects of the group are seen as an important part of what we are about, and to this end all site visits include coffee on arrival at the venue where possible, followed by lunch at or near the place visited for those wishing to socialise further.

ASTRONOMY



Meetings so far have covered a range of topics, including Earth satellites and space probes, the orbits of planets, comets, meteors, types of telescopes, elements in stars and measuring astronomical distances.

We have attended some of the public lectures at the Royal Observatory at Blackford Hill in Edinburgh. We are in close contact with the Tweeddale Astronomical Society. One of our group has a telescope that can be used to view the moon, stars and planets.

BOOKS FOR ALL



The group aims to be informal, meeting in the evening in members' homes. Due to this, and some remaining Covid considerations, we have kept the group to ten people. We meet

throughout the year and also have a fun get together around New Year (very) loosely based on literature themes.



FILM GROUP 1



This group has been in existence for some 15 years. Until lockdown we met in each other's homes to watch the film together and to discuss it over a cup of tea. The size of the Group depended on the number that could be accommodated in each other's homes.

During and since lockdown we have met virtually on the first Tuesday afternoon of each month to discuss a film. We plan to continue with this arrangement for the foreseeable future.

During the month leading up to the discussion, we pass round the DVD of the chosen film. The films we watch are usually of a quite serious and thought- provoking nature.

FILM FANS



Before each meeting one of the members suggests two films which they think will be of interest, and the group votes on which one to watch. We choose a fairly eclectic selection of films from classics to recent releases, some on serious issues and some more lighthearted.

After watching the film, we discuss aspects of it, such as the main theme, the portrayal of the characters, the rôles of the actors and other relevant topics arising from the film.

We usually meet in the home of the person whose choice of film we are going to watch, and our meetings are held on the fourth Monday of each month. Currently we only have six members and would be happy to have one new more. Obviously, we cannot have a group larger than can be accommodated in a home and everyone present must be able to see the screen.

GARDENING



The group meets on the third Friday of the month from March to October. On these days we normally visit a garden which is open to the public under the Scotland's Garden Scheme, but may open by arrangement to groups such as ours.

During peak gardening months we also occasionally visit members' gardens on an *ad hoc* basis. Most

visits take place in the afternoon and occasionally we enjoy a full day out, but always attempt to return before 5pm.

Member share their love of plants and gardens. We learn from each other about garden design and plants suitable for Peebleshire gardens. The programme tries to offer variety for members' shared pleasure, inspiration and education. Not all our members have gardens, and we are certainly not all experts in plants or garden design, although some of our members are very knowledgeable!

In February we hold a planning meeting where we draw up a programme for the season from suggestions made by members for visits to local gardens and nurseries, although occasionally further afield. At the end of the year we normally hold a pot-luck lunch or an afternoon tea.

GERMAN CONVERSATION



The German conversation group meets on Thursday or Friday mornings, by mutual agreement. Currently members are jointly reading *Der Vorleser* by Bernhard Schlink, to help in the understanding of complex German writing.

HISTORY



What does the U3A History group do - and how do we do it?

We aim to meet on the third Thursday of each month (apart from December, July and August).

The category "history" is defined as more or less any historically relevant topic from 1000 AD onwards.

Most of our sessions are talks and occasionally computer presentations, prepared by members of the group. Each talk generally last about 30 to 40 minutes and is followed by questions, and sometimes sharing source materials.

In September we have a planning meeting when we usually fill our calendar with subjects suggested by members. This pre-planning means that each month the entire group can prepare for the chosen topic, and this results in a lively post-presentation discussion.

We have great fun, learn a lot, and we all contribute.

Recent topics have included Nellie Bly, the first person to travel around the world in under 80 days; the effects of the Mayflower; the history of Foodbanks; and Daniel Defoe.

We currently meet in the Studio at the Eastgate Theatre.

INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS



This group was formed in the autumn of 2020 as a result of the amalgamation of the Future of Europe and International Justice groups.

After meeting on-line during the worst of the pandemic, the group now meets in person, but has continued to enable access to the group through Zoom for people

unable to meet in person. We also monitor the air quality during the meeting.

The group meets on the third Wednesday of each month, starting at 09.30.

The group format involves selecting an agree topic for discussion, preferably with an introduction by a member of the group, followed by a group discussion.

Although not exhaustive, the following topics are those which the group plans to address: global migration, economic and social differences between countries, access issues (e.g. medicines, justice), globalisation, defence and aid policies, slavery (ancient and modern), climate change and governance.

LOCAL HISTORY



If you live in the Tweeddale area you can't help but be fascinated by the amount of history we have on our doorstep. Pre-history and Roman history, Border reivers and Covenanters, French sailors and German hotel owners, mills and mail coaches, railways, elephants and explorers.

You don't have to be an expert in history, local or otherwise, to be involved in our group. New to the area, or resident all your life, you just have to share our interest.

Sometimes we cover one topic with one

presentation; sometimes we have shorter presentations from two or three members. This year we created a town trail, and are planning a wide variety of talks and a couple of visits. Members might arrange a visit to a local place of interest, or lead a walk around a local area. We have explored Tweeddale by minibus, led by one of the group. We also improved our research skills by a visit and talk at Hawick Heritage Hub.

LUNCH GROUP



Meets on the first Wednesday of each month at a variety of venues.

NATURAL HISTORY



We generally meet fortnightly on Thursdays for half or whole days. but in winter less frequently. The group began with birds and plants, but now promotes a broad interest in Natural History and environmental issues.

We visit areas around Peebles, along the Tweed and Manor Valley. Sometimes we venture further afield e.g. to St Abbs Head, Musselburgh Lagoons, Carrifran Wildwood.

We have amateur experts in several areas, but all learn from one another. Everyone is welcome.

PHOTOGRAPHY



We meet on the first Tuesday afternoon of the month.

The aim of this group is to learn, share, gain confidence, satisfy, amuse and enjoy; learning through doing and informal exchange of knowledge and experience.

The level of expertise and sophistication of equipment are less important than an open mind and a good eye for a picture. Whether you are a happy snapper or a more serious photographer you are welcome.

POETRY



We meet on the third Monday of each month in the Macfarlane Hall in the Old Parish Church from 2-4pm.

The subjects for the year are chosen by member, and each month we have a theme such as The Sea, or Friendship. But equally we may focus on a specific poet.

Good quality prose is welcome as well as participants' own compositions (although we are not a creative writing group). Usually we have time to read two poems each, sometimes more, and it's a good idea to have a selection available in case there are duplicates.

RUSSIAN LITERATURE




The group meets once a month hosted by the person who has chosen the book. The group has been running for roughly six years and during that time we have read books from the Golden Age of Russian literature, including Lermontov, Chekov, Pushkin, plus more modern Russian

authors such as Sorokin, Gazdanov, Teffi, etc.

The format of the group is that the person choosing the book, provides a biography of the author and a short historical context. We discuss the book in some depth having often taken some notes whilst reading the novel. So some work is asked of group members but this is rewarded by often stimulating and interesting discussions.

SHORT WALKS



The Shorter Walks group meets every Wednesday 9.30am at the Peebles Post Office corner. Short Walks vary from "very easy" along a river path to "slightly more challenging" gentle hills and woodland paths out of town, from 2 to 3.5 miles in distance. We are never on our feet for longer than 1.5 hours, usually less.

A route of each walk is emailed each week and there is usually an option to peel off to make a shorter circuit home for the less able. Sometimes we involve use of a bus to the start or finish or both. We assume everyone has a bus pass. We always finish the walk at a coffee stop.

TABLE TENNIS



We meet weekly on Thursday at 2.30pm in St Joseph's Hall, Wemyss Place. We have fun and get exercise. Equipment is provided. We encourage you to come along and give it a try.

The group runs from October through to May.

WALKING



Arranged every Wednesday, we meet either at 9.30am in Kingsmeadows Car Park, Peebles or at the start of the walk normally at 10 to 10.30am. Car sharing is encouraged.

The group is organised and led by a member on the day and the details are circulated by email beforehand. Please inform the walk leader that you wish to go on the walk and provide the leader with contact details.

The walk locations range from the Pentlands, Tweed Valley and the Melrose area. Car-sharing is limited at present but if required a contribution to fuel costs should be made. The distances of the walks are between five to eight miles, (long) one week and less than five the next (medium) and are usually in the mornings but occasionally a packed lunch is required.
