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Chair's Address to the 2023 AGM

There is new energy in our u3a as we have learned to live with covid and it comes from an increase in the membership. From 418 members last year to now 468, this is nearer the pre-covid figures.

There are 3 events that stand out.

- 1. The Garden Party held in June, organised by Sarah Bowen and Vivien Hubbuck and supported by many members who volunteered. It was a lovely day. 65 people attended and we raised £305 for St Oswald's Hospice.
- 2. The Open Day held in September to coincide with National u3a week was a memorable success.
- 3.Our new Facebook page Thanks to Sally Hewitt's efforts we are raising our profile and in touch with new people. We have 104 members, and it is growing. We would like more members to post pieces particularly photographs of activities.

Last year we set out to hold regular coffee mornings for new and potential members. We held 6 this year which proved to be a lovely opportunity to get to know new members. Also, last March we held a lunch for convenors as a thank you for keeping the groups going and plan to repeat it this year.

During the year new groups emerged while a few that didn't survive covid closed. The range of group activity has been diverse, including residential outings and day trips. Reading about them in the newsletter suggests we are having fun.

All our monthly meetings have been in person, and we have heard some inspiring speakers. We switched to having refreshments after the meeting to provide more opportunity for socialising which has been welcomed.

We are into our third season of Desert Island Discs thanks to the commitment of Mike Worthington, Barrie and Gill Mellars, and our Castaways. This month will be our last, so we will end on a high.

I am fortunate to have chaired a committee of competent and committed trustees. We are losing only two members this year so continuity will be maintained. Susan Turnbull who has been Business Secretary for the last 3 years and in her quiet way kept things ticking over is changing role to that of Assistant Treasurer.

A current weakness of Tynedale u3a is our engagement with the national and regional structure. Having been key players in the past we now contribute little and do not involve members in the machinations of these structures. I hope we can improve in the coming year.

We will badge everything we do in the year as a 40th anniversary celebration. We are collecting lots of memories and we hope to put these together in a small publication.

Sage 'Behind the Scenes' Visit

A group of 20 of us spent a lovely morning being guided around the usually unseen areas (as well as the performance areas) of the Sage, Gateshead. The two guides were very knowledgable and informative and they explained the innovative technology which made the venue so acoustically and visually remarkable. The designers went to great lengths to perfect the sound performance and apparently there are very few square rooms there. Sage 2 is 10 sided. Sage 1 looks rectangular but on inspection actually has waved walls to control sound reverberations and floating, movable ceiling panels that can be raised and lowered to change the acoustics of the room. Northern Rock Foundation Hall has one curved wall, and all walls are lined with what they called 'barcodes', wooden slats to improve the acoustics even further.

We saw the dressing rooms and heard some interesting backstage gossip about the various performers!

This was all rounded of with hot drinks and cakes (included in the price), and time to chat. All in all it was a very enjoyable experience.

Oh well, it was worth a try!






Projects with the Grandchildren

Environment group

In March we met with the Senior Waste Management officer for Northumberland who talked to us about the different waste management operations that occur in the North East and the reasons we have ended up with inconsistent practices. In Northumberland mattresses are the only item of waste that regularly end up in landfill as other general waste goes to Teesside to a SUEZ plant that produces energy from waste. We have identified this as a possible trip for later in the year after members have visited the Recycling plant.

The focus of much discussion was on recycling and again we learned the importance of getting it right. **If in doubt put items in general waste**. There is a huge cost if recycled material is found to be contaminated and must be despatched to Teesside. The most frequent contaminants are nappies and dog waste.

We learned about the intention to have kerbside glass collection and food waste collection and the challenges this poses to local authorities, and particularly Northumberland.

WINE APPRECIATION GROUP 2

We had our first meeting in January, unfortunately people have dropped out for a variety of reasons, so we are down to 4/5, therefore we need to recruit additional people.

The planned relaunch is May on a day and time to be decided once we have definite numbers.

Below is a summary of the wines we tasted to give people a feel of what we did, you do not have to be an expert, it is a fun group where we learn together.

All wines were sourced from the wine society.

White Burgandy-£12.95 Unoaked and fresh Pale Gold Nose was apple, stone fruits and lemon. Taste was rounded, slightly floral with apple overtones.

White Rioja - £9.25 Oaked Blend of 90% old-vine viura and 10& malvasia Lemony Gold Nose was vanilla and spice , with a hint toast, nuts and ripe apple Taste was similar to the nose with a balanced acidity

French Syrah - £7.95 Rhone Valley Dark Red /Crimson A berry aroma from Cherry and cracked black pepper(?) Nose similar to nose + blueberry and damson Medium acidity, with Tannins firm and dry

Australian Shiraz - £8.95 Deep red with a purple tinge. Nose ripe berries and a hint of vanilla and spice Full flavour of berries and a good taste with a hint of vanilla and oak. Tannins are present but ripe and sweet with a medium acidity which gave a good balance to the wine.

The consensus of the group was that the White Rioja and Australian Shiraz were the superior wines
