# 'Cramlington Train Wreckers' given by Ed Waugh

North-east based playright Ed Waugh's work includes the self-penned national hits 'Wor Bella', 'Carrying David' and 'Hadaway Harry', as well as the co-written 'Dirty Dusting'.

Ed has national and international hit plays in the UK, New Zealand and Ireland. Also, he has more than 21 professional full play credits to his name,

His co-written film script 'The Liquidator' won the Gotham Screen International Film Festival award for Best Comedy Screenplay in 2010 in New York and was also shorlisted for the Best Screenplay award.

During the 1926 General Strike, miners in Cramlington accidentally derailed the Flying Scotsman. No one was killed and only one person was slightly injured. However, eight Northumberland miners were sentenced to 48 years' penal servitude.

The story is one of high dramatic tension and has become an important part of British history, although largely forgotten today.

#### Chair's Report 2024

It has been a privilege to be chair of Tynedale u3a, none so much as last year when we celebrated our 40-year anniversary.

We have gone from strength to strength. Last year I was proud to say we had 468 members and now we have 571, an increase of 22%. A busy year for the membership secretary, who held 4 well attended coffee mornings in the Abbey for new and potential members.

#### 40-year celebrations

We launched our 40th anniversary at our 2023 AGM and heard from three key long-standing, members about some of the transitions. Several members of 10 years or more shared their memories in written form or agreed to a recorded interview. These were included in our newsletters and appear in our 40-year history.

Our Afternoon Tea at the Mart on the 22<sup>nd</sup> July was the climax and an enjoyable occasion for those who came along. We are grateful to The Mart who made it a special occasion.

We gained publicity from the celebrations. There was an interview on Hexham TV with Margaret Jacot one of our older members and Adrian Woolley a recent active member. A consequence of inviting the deputy mayor to our Afternoon Tea, I was invited to a Town council meeting (which spawned a meeting at the Community Centre) and a Rotary Club lunch. There was also a piece in the Courant.

Tynedale u3a now has a stronger profile and we are recognised by other groups in the community.

At the beginning of the year, we did not have an events secretary but when Margaret Earl stepped forward everything took off. There were trips to the following:

We had a successful quiz in March, and you only need to read the newsletter to realise there have been many more fun excursions run by our groups. Also, this year there was a national event held in our area, "Off The Wall -Hadrian's Wall Festival" to which we contributed and participated.

#### Monthly meetings

Our monthly meetings have continued with a range of speakers and attendance figures have risen. It has been necessary to look for a new venue as we do not want to turn people away. We have switched from zoom to recording the meeting and the feedback is that the filming is much preferred. There have been two extra talks during the year which is a trend we would like to continue.

#### **Interest Groups**

The annual Convenors lunch was a very enjoyable occasion and an opportunity to share group issues. Accommodation has been a key issue as groups for new groups and established ones.

The growth in membership has resulted in either much larger groups or the creation of a second groups. We are hoping there will be new groups like Modern Greek, Carpet bowls and French Cinema. New ideas are always welcome.

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#### **Chair's Report continued - The Committee**

It might appear that I have been careless in losing a few committee members during the year, but that has not been the case. We have had 3 treasurers who all have done a great job and Barbara Redpath and Susan Turnbull both did far more than the Treasurer's role during their time on the committee.

Sally Hewitt who has only recently left the public relations post is responsible for much of the growth and raised profile. Kate Stephenson and Ally Forster have already made a significant contribution and have been very welcome.

My hearing started going some 15 years ago and I had NHS hearing aids up until a couple of years ago when the misnamed Specsavers in Carlisle gave some excellent aids in exchange for a lot of plastic. But perhaps Specsavers is not badly labelled. Morpeth-based Vision Northumberland, formerly the county blind association now has a Hearing Support officer who travels around the county. So, they can be a useful point of contact via <a href="https://vision-northumberland.org/">https://vision-northumberland.org/</a>. They also come to Hexham now and then to answer questions.

Perhaps of more immediate benefit for some are devices. A Loop System has helped many when in meetings in larger rooms. Sadly I was disappointed with the BT phone I bought designed for the hearing impaired as it didn't have the whoomph I needed. So it was great to learn about Connevans, <a href="https://www.connevans.co.uk/viewPage.do?id=index">https://www.connevans.co.uk/viewPage.do?id=index</a> which offers a wide range of practical devices. Mobile call quality varies and like Joanna Lumley I find them intrusive. I therefore have a great new landline handset with an adjustable volume control.

Hopefully, the future will bring us automatic rejection of all spam calls but I'm not crossing my fingers yet. Of possible interest and to help family harmony, Connevans also do other devices such as special amplifiers allowing you to hear the TV without overwhelming others in the room.

And finally, when your ear buds won't flower when listening to the radio, good headphones do make difference and are worth the investment for radio heads.

#### **Environment Group: Northumberland's Border Mires**

For our March meeting we were treated to a presentation by Bill Burlden, also a U3A member, who not only explained the process of peatland formation for carbon sequestration, but identified an area containing a series of deep peat 'lenses' in Northumberland, known as The Border Mires.

The area of Border Mires stretches approximately between the Stanegate and Bellingham, and to the East from Brampton to Rothbury. Geologically, the mires were formed as hollows in the north - south orientated scarp and dipslope landscape in this area were deepened during the ice age. When the ice retreated, over the following 10,000 years the hollows filled with peat. Each 'mire' contains an especially deep peat deposit, of up to 10 metres, or 35 feet.

As concern over global warming has mounted in recent years, the value of peatlands like The Border Mires has been widely recognised as a sink for carbon dioxide. In fact, carbon stored in peat equates to over half the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. Furthermore, the mires support variety of Sphagnum mosses and rare bog plants which have a high value in terms of conservation.

From 1945 to 1970, however, peat deposits were largely threatened by agricultural drainage schemes and forestation, as these contributed to drying the peat, and so releasing carbon dioxide. Long term, plantation forests are nevertheless a valuable and sustainable wood resource, and they sequester as much carbon as is emitted from cultivated peat. The focus now is therefore to remove slower growing tree species, and to block drainage ditches to encourage the peat to re-wet. In Kielder Forest alone, some 52 peatland sites covering around 2000 hectares are now being restored in this way, to re-activate the process of peat formation and so allow carbon sequestration to continue.

# Minutes of Tynedale u3a Annual General Meeting 2024 held at 2pm on Tuesday 5th March in the Great Hall, Hexham Abbey

- 1. Welcome: The Chair, Wendy Dale welcomed all members to the 2024 AGM
- 2. Apologies were received from Geoff Holdcroft, Ray Bather, Sally Hewitt, Sarah Walsh, Adrian Woolley, Julia Woolley, John Harrison, Averil Harrison, Jacqui Kerr
- 3. Minutes of 2023 AGM which were published in the March newsletter were accepted as an accurate record.
- 4. Matters arising: Wendy informed that as a result of a change in the Treasurer, the examiner of accounts had changed from that stated in the minutes.
- 5. Chair's Report: Wendy stated that she was privileged to be the Chair and was proud to be a part of the organisation. She detailed the key activities that had taken place over the last year and the support that been provided by the committee. Wendy's full report will be published in the April newsletter.
- 6. Treasurer's Report: The Treasurer Kate Stephenson informed that the accounts were in a good condition generally. Savings had been made not renewing membership cards which saved on postage and not using the Hexham Courant for publicity had also been a saving. Inflation costs did not materialise and general running costs are being covered. A new sound system for the Mart monthly meetings and associated furniture costs will be bought from reserves. There is £19,000 in reserves and the current £14 subscription is enough to cover the general running costs.

The accounts were agreed unanimously.

- 7. Election of Chair: The election of Barrie Mellars as Chair was agreed unanimously. Barrie took over the meeting and stated he was privileged to work with everyone. He informed about his background and made a special vote of thanks to Wendy for all the work that she had done for u3a.
- 8. Committee Motions

73 attendees voted and 45 electronic votes and 13 postal votes were received from non- attendees.

It was proposed that Tynedale u3a will adopt a revised constitution that is in line with the model recommended by the Third Age Trust. The benefits are that the revised document is more comprehensive and accessible. The current constitution has been subject to piecemeal revisions and is limited in scope. The change is not anticipated to have any consequences for the running of Tynedale u3a.

The motion was agreed by a significant majority.

It was proposed that Tynedale u3a will rent office accommodation at the community centre in Hexham for a period of 12 months when an office becomes available. The purpose is to support small interest groups who are having difficulty accessing appropriate accommodation and to assist the development of new groups. The benefits will be assessed after one year and if the committee is satisfied that the arrangements are cost effective the rent period will continue and be kept under review.

Colin Argent, Group Liaison Secretary spoke in support of the motion indicated that we have an increased membership and currently 54 groups and there was a need to encourage new groups as well as providing a venue for small groups which were struggling to find somewhere to meet. Having a small meeting room in the community centre would make it easy for the spawning of groups. There would also be reduced rates on bigger rooms so current groups could expand. There were options for three other rooms, a boardroom, a room for up to 50 people and another for up to 100 people. The community centre would be a trial for a year. Barrie informed that the golf club had served us well, the room layout was not ideal but he believed that this was a step forward.

Questions from the membership included the criteria for success. It was stated that there would be monitoring of the rooms used and constant assessment, looking at the percentage of membership using it. A member stated that there is a need to look at evaluating objectives in terms of measuring the development of groups and new groups. This was agreed.

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There was also a question about the costs of the rooms. Barrie informed that the small room would be free and larger room free in the first instance. For bigger meetings there would be a charge. The small room would cost £273.60 per month, £3283.20 for the year and will come out of reserves. The larger room would take 15 boardroom style and up to 20 comfortably. A projector, screen and sound system are available. A monitor will be put in the small room and keys cut to enable convenors to access or they could obtain the key from reception. This will be on a booked basis. The booking of larger rooms will be dependent on availability. A member asked if it was possible to sub-let the room but it was felt that this would be unlikely.

The motion was agreed by a large majority, three attendees voted against the motion.

Barrie informed that the driving force for this booklet was a reminder in 2022 that the anniversary was coming up.

Members who had been in the organisation over 10 years were asked to give their memories and interviews were carried out by Sally Hewitt, the Publications Secretary. Unfortunately there were gaps and it was important to have a story to tell.

Barrie talked of the trials and tribulations producing the booklet which included accessing paper records from 3 large boxes from Northumberland Archives at Woodhorn. Archived material ran out from 2007 until 2016. Fortunately John De Stefano had newsletters from 1992-2009 and 2011-2016.

There were constant rewrites until it was time to call a halt and turn it into a brochure.

Colin and Wendy were driving forces ensuring its completion and Barrie concluded 'recollections may vary'.
