#### **Topic: Geograph: Photograph every grid square**

#### **Speaker: Oliver Dixon**

The Geograph Britain and Ireland project is an internet-based community project aims to collect geographically representative photographs and which information for every square kilometre of Great Britain and Ireland.

### Annual general meeting

The AGM is the time when we confirm the committee for the coming year. Members can stand for any of the roles, but we are keen to have nominations for the roles that become vacant.

The role of Groups Liaison Secretary has been filled by Colin Argent since the last AGM and we are required to confirm the appointment.

The committee has decided to reinstate the role of Beacon Administrator, and as a member has already expressed an interest in this, we hope to appoint at the AGM.

#### Publicity

You should try to persuade local publications, especially the Hexham Courant, the various village publications and Tynedale Express, to accept short news items about our u3a. This is, perhaps, the most difficult part of the job since there is not a lot that we do which could be regarded as 'newsworthy'. You will also need to design and write advertisements for any of these publications as required by the committee. Recently, we have focused on display adverts in the Courant, but this could change according to budgets and the need to attract new members. The current officer will provide you with a list of contacts for each of the publications and for the advertisers.

#### Website

Our website is run centrally by u3a site administrators who host the site. It is very simple for local u3a officers to operate, but very limited in terms of the variety of images, text display and videos that it can host. But it is the 'shop window' of our u3a and has recently been partially redesigned to appeal as much to new members as to existing members. This redesign could continue and develop. The current postholder will set you up with an administrator's password so that you can access all areas of the website. Several individual group pages are edited by group leaders or members and you will control their access. The busiest time of years is just after the AGM, when you need to put the new committee members onto the contact page and help them set up a u3a email address.

### Group news and activities

#### **Environment group**

#### Is bamboo eco friendly?

When the Environment group met in January via Zoom, it considered the sustainability of bamboo.

Bamboo products are promoted as environmentally friendly and have arrived on the market in different guises: toothbrushes, toilet paper, fabrics, mugs and many more.





Bamboo is a fast growing and naturally renewable tree-like grass. It needs little maintenance to farm and very little water to grow; it doesn't need to be replanted, and thrives without pesticides or herbicides.

One of the biggest environmental benefits of bamboo is its ability to absorb carbon dioxide and produce oxygen. Compared to an equivalent tree mass, bamboo produces 35% more oxygen, and research has shown that bamboo can absorb as much as 12 tons of carbon dioxide per hectare per year.

The downside is that increased demand for bamboo has turned it into a monoculture, currently in China. It therefore creates problems for diversity and negatively impacts on ecosystems.

The group discussed some of the products currently available, and considered their merits against their carbon footprint, processing and chemicals used.
