Denis Harry Fox is a military history and landscape artist who lives in Durham City. He was born in Seaham in 1944 and studied at Durham University and later at Newcastle University.

Denis retired from teaching art at Emmanuel College, Gateshead in 2011 and since then he has been more involved with producing his own work for exhibitions.

He tells the story of the Battle of Britain in NE England through the medium of his paintings. His artwork has been displayed all over the North East.

We have also been advised that the Abbey are going to purchase more chairs, but if they haven't arrived before our February meeting there will be fold up seats from the Abbey available.

Cecilia Coulson the chair of the Northumbria Region will be attending our February meeting and will introduce herself at the start. It is her plan to visit all the u3a's in the region to learn more about how they operate.

We have our **AGM coming up in March** and I am hoping we will have a good turnout.

There will be **2 motions from the committee**, one concerning a revised constitution and one concerning accommodation in the community centre. They are included in this newsletter.

Members can stand for any of the committee posts all they require is a proposer and seconder.

We need to receive **nominations by 13th February** (21days before the AGM).

I will be standing down, as will Colin Argent as Group-Fixer, Barrie Mellars as Programme Secretary and Sally Hewitt as Publicity Officer.

Sally Hewitt stood down in January and Ally Forster is willing to take on the role.

The remaining members of the committee are willing to stand for another term.

At the AGM we will need to confirm in post our new Treasurer Kate Stephenson and Ally Forster as Publicity Officer.

Barrie Mellars will be standing as Chair.

There will be 2 vacancies on the committee which I would like your help in filling.

- 1. The role of **Programme Secretary** with responsibility for managing the monthly meetings and organising speakers.
- 2. The role of **Group liaison Secretary**, currently known as the group fixer, with responsibility for providing support to current groups and facilitating the development of new groups. This role can be done by two people, but they will need to work well together.

If you would be willing to consider either of these roles, please contact Barrie Mellars or me.

Following the AGM we will be launching the booklet **40 year History of Tynedale u3a** that Barrie Mellars and others have been working on during the year.

Committee Motions for the AGM

We have 2 committee motions, and we propose to ensure that all members can vote on them. We will be sending out a postal vote to all members who do not have email with this newsletter. They will be asked to use this vote if they do not plan on attending the AGM. All other members will be sent an electronic link and again advised that they should use it if they are unable to attend the AGM.

If we receive other motions from members within 21 days of the AGM, we will incorporate them in the electronic voting and seek to ensure those with a postal vote have an opportunity to vote.

Motion 1

Following the last AGM, the committee was concerned that the current constitution had not assisted the process of managing a controversial motion. It formed the view that it should be revisited. It found the style was out of step with the national model and had limited scope. The committee, in recommending that we adopt a revised constitution recognises that it will not have an impact on the current running of Tynedale u3a.

The Motion

Tynedale u3a will adopt a revised constitution that is in line with the model recommended by the Third Age Trust. The benefits are that the revised document is more comprehensive and accessible. The current constitution has been subject to piecemeal revisions and is limited in scope. The change is not anticipated to have any consequences for the running of Tynedale u3a.

Motion 2

In the last year with the increasing membership and a reducing number of group rooms available, some groups have been meeting in unsuitable accommodation. Colin Argent has spent time looking at options. One of the options that we became aware of during this process was the option to rent an office at the Community Centre. The cost at the current time would be £217 per month.

The benefits of having an office would be:

- 1. a meeting room for small groups with good internet access, a screen and other technical equipment
- 2. a bigger room free for 3 hours a month
- 3. a reduced rate for the large rooms and any other workspace
- 4. Free publicity using their sites.

The Committee feel there could be more benefits to members with the association with the community centre and feel that as Tynedale u3a is in a strong financial position it is worth testing this out for a 12-month period.

The committee are bringing this matter to the AGM because it is a departure from recent practice and would like to have the support of the membership. At the current time there isn't an office available, but we know when one is it is likely to be snapped up.

The Motion

Tynedale u3a will rent office accommodation at the community centre in Hexham for a period of 12 months when an office becomes available. The purpose is to support small interest groups who are having difficulty accessing appropriate accommodation and to assist the development of new groups. The benefits will be assessed after one year and if the committee is satisfied that the arrangements are cost effective the rent period will continue and be kept under review.


Sex, Money and Revenge

ENVIRONMENT GROUP

Carbon sinks were the subject for discussion at our first meeting after a break for Christmas. So what is a carbon sink and why are they important? The simplest definition of a carbon sink is that it is a reservoir of carbon that absorbs carbon in larger quantities than it releases it, and today that particularly applies to carbon dioxide.

Carbon dioxide is a greenhouse gas keeping the Earth warm by acting as a blanket that prevents too much warmth generated on Earth from escaping into the Universe. It has a crucial role in regulating global temperature.

The last time the global temperature was stable was some 200 years ago when the average temperature was about 15 degrees and the concentration of CO2 in the atmosphere was around 280 parts per million. That has now risen to around 420 parts per million and still rising, and it will go on rising until we reach net carbon zero, possibly in 2050. Meanwhile global temperature has already warmed by more than one degree and is continuing to rise. CO2 is not the only greenhouse gas, but it is the most important one even though it is only 0.04% of the atmosphere. This is equivalent to about three drops of water in a litre, but as was demonstrated during the presentation, if those three drops are red cooking dye the water becomes bright pink, showing that very small quantities can have a powerful effect.

There are natural carbon sinks which remove CO2 from the atmosphere.

The three most important ones are the vegetation, the oceans and the soil, but the effectiveness of all three depends to some extent on the way we manage the land and the sea. Together they remove about two thirds of the CO2 we are currently producing, and It appears unlikely that abandoning the use of fossil fuels will on its own, be enough to lower the concentration of CO2 back to the level it was 200 years ago.

Capturing CO2 from industrial processes, and removing it directly from the atmosphere are both established processes now, but the problem then becomes what to do with it.

Currently there are three man-made solutions.

CO2 can be liquified by putting it under pressure, as in a fire extinguisher, and then it could be buried in the space created by extracting fossil fuels in the first place.

Secondly if a mixture of CO2 and water is injected underground into basalt rock, stable carbon based compounds are produced which lock the carbon away. Basalt is commonly found in volcanic areas, and there is now an installation in Iceland that is using the energy from the hot springs to power the removal of CO2 from the atmosphere and inject it into basalt deep under the ground.

Thirdly we produce a great deal of waste vegetation which is usually allowed to rot or is burned. In both cases large amounts of CO2 are emitted. If waste vegetation is heated in an oxygen free atmosphere it does not burn or rot, but turns into a form of charcoal called biochar. This process does emit some carbon based inflammable gases, but much of the carbon remains as a solid, locked away in the charcoal which can be ground up and used as a soil improver.

Carbon Capture and Storage (CCS) is controversial because countries and industries that extract and market fossil fuels use it as a justification for the continued extraction and use of such fuels.

Those who oppose this attitude point out that the growth of CCS may divert interest and investment away from the development of carbon free energy which many think is a safer and more reliable longterm solution.

Is there a compromise, and how or when will it be reached?
