Topic: Tyne River Trust

Speaker: Jenny Elliott



Created in 2004 to mitigate the effect of the construction of the second Tyne Tunnel on the river's ecosystem, Tyne Rivers Trust is the only environmental charity dedicated to looking after the Tyne rivers.

The work they do aims to tackle the effects of climate change and support the wildlife and landscape of the Tyne rivers.

The Trust looks to improve the fish population, tackle invasive species, reintroduce water voles, measure the rivers' health, and generally look after

the region's rivers from Alston and Kielder to Tynemouth.

The Trust aims to achieve this by working with local communities and applying scientific knowledge and environmental skills.

Tea and coffee will be served after the meeting.

Wildlife Group

Greetings from the fledgeling Wildlife group. We are currently a small group but enthusiastic about all things wildlife and would like to grow. We are planning our programme for the rest of the year into early 2023, including indoor and outdoor meetings to share our interests and get to know each other.

On Monday 13 June we are meeting near Corbridge to visit the Dilston Physic Garden with over 800 medicinal plants. We will learn how plants that grow wild in different parts of the world are used to benefit medicine and wellbeing.

In July we will visit The Spetchells near Prudhoe. These mounds of chalk waste, the by-product of 20th century industries, now support a flora and insect fauna more typical of southern England at this unique site in Northumberland.

Topics for the autumn and into the new year include USA state flowers and their protection, and finding wildlife in the Camargue area of Provence, southern France.

We will visit the Washington Wetland Centre early in the new year when the waterbirds are in their most colourful plumage.
