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


Monthly Meeting, Tuesday 4 October 2022 at 2pm in the Great Hall, Hexham Abbey - and on Zoom

Topic: The rediscovery and rebuilding of Joe the Quilter's cottage

Speaker: Richard Young

Richard Young has studied building history for over 35 years and is a founder member of the Traditional Architecture Group (TAG). He is a former teacher and lecturer in interior design and architectural history, and holder of an advanced diploma in local history from Oxford University. Richard has also worked as a volunteer archaeologist on projects ranging from Roman Roads to Eighteenth Century Industry. His aim is to help owners of older properties learn more about the history of their houses and seek advice on sympathetic renovation and decoration.

Groups news and activities

Environment group

We met in September to complete arrangements for the Open Day and hear about two climate virtual workshops held since our last meeting. This led to an impromptu discussion about the role of the economy and its management in determining the fate of the environment, as opposed to the vagaries of human nature, and our willingness or unwilligness to change attitudes and adapt our behaviour.

What is economics, a science, a philosophy, a tool? Perhaps all three. We are fortunate to have an economist as one of our members, who explained that economists can only measure that which can be expressed in numbers such as the GDP, and this can lead to apparent simplification of complex issues. In the end it is how economic advice is formulated, received and then implemented by us that determines the effect it may have individually, on our communities and on the environment.

Wildlife group

Life is full of surprises and on our walk along the riverbank today, we found plenty. The sun came out, the path was not muddy, and we saw nearly 50 different species of flowers, grasses and trees.

With Jenny as a guide, we soon became knowledgeable about which flower belonged to which group and why. For instance, the Thistle, Dandelion, Ragwort and Burdock all belong to the Daisy family and their

seeds are dispersed into the air, while the Meadowsweet, Greater Burnet, Silverweed and Lady's Mantle belong to the Rose group. Rowans and Hawthorns also belong to this group, and their seeds either fall to the ground or are eaten by birds and deposited elsewhere.

The Bedstraws and Madders group owe their name to some which are fragrant when dried and were used to stuff mattresses in the Middle Ages. We saw the Crosswort and Marsh Bedstraw in this group. Most of course were no longer flowering but would still look very attractive in a vase.

Grasses were also numerous, and the two I found most interesting were the Cocksfoot Grass, so called because of its spur, and the Yorkshire Fog Grass, so called because of the effect of its purple flowerheads



growing in a mass. Such names remind us that they have been around for centuries and have become part of our folklore.

The fauna, unfortunately, were not as common as the flora, but the reason for this is simple. Fauna move, flora do not! And with autumn upon us many are no longer around. But we did see the Small White Butterfly and the Speckled Wood butterfly along with two dragonflies, one of which was the Common Darter.

Along the river we saw a few late Swallows and of course the inevitable Mallard, our most common duck, I think. But the highlight of the day must be the sighting, not once but twice, of a Kingfisher darting down the river and back, its iridescent plumage glinting in the sun. For me it was the loveliest surprise of all.

The whole afternoon had been a very rewarding one, and the impression I took away from it is that every plant, big or small, has some story to tell if we have the patience to study it.

Haltwhistle Walking Festival - Taster Walks: 'Allendale Adventures', Saturday 1st October, and 'Haltwhistle Hikes', Sunday 2nd October 2022 at 10am

The aim of the 'Taster Walks' is for people to discover how far they can walk and find out what it is like to take part in a group walk. The focus is on 'lapsed or slower or lacking in confidence walkers' possibly due to Covid.

On Saturday 1st October the 'Allendale Adventures' begin and end in Allendale marketplace, and on Sunday 2nd October the 'Haltwhistle Hikes' begin and finish in the marketplace at Haltwhistle.

Each day there is a choice of walks either 4, 6 or 8 miles. Whatever the intention at the beginning, if people find they could go further or want to finish earlier, they can join the appropriate group and arrive back where they started.

We have a good number of bookings for the Sunday at Haltwhistle, helped by the Hadrian's Wall 1900 anniversary celebrations, but we still have several places available at Allendale on Saturday 1st October.

This year the form is even easier - if you've not changed address or any of your contact details, you can simply indicate that, put in your name, tell us how you are paying and whether we can claim Gift Aid, and just press 'Submit'.

(The 'reference' is essential for us to process your renewal.)

If paying by cheque, remember to make it payable to '**Tynedale u3a**'. It can be posted with any paper forms, sent separately to the Membership Secretary at West Oakwood House, Hexham NE46 4LB, or handed in at one of the monthly meetings.

Alternatively, the renewal form can be printed off from the website (again there is a link), completed and posted to the Membership Secretary. For those receiving the newsletter by post, a form is included.

If you have a Standing Order for the subscription including TAM, **PLEASE** can you ensure that the increase to £17.35 has been done - this saves us chasing you for 25p!
