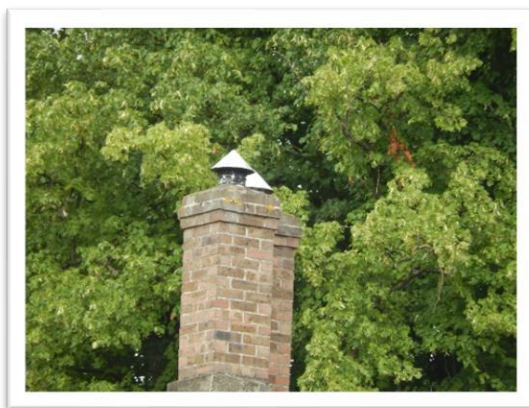

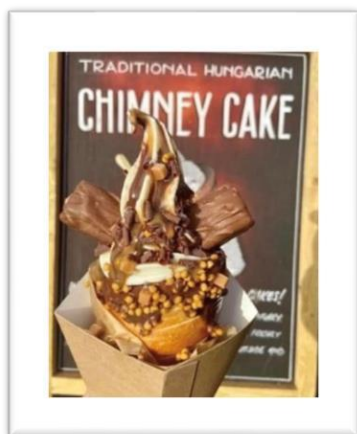

## History Group

On Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> July the history group finally visited Creswell Crags. I say finally as the visit was originally planned over two years ago to compliment a fascinating talk given to the group by Darryl, from Ice Age Journeys. However, lockdown got in the way and the visit was put further and further back in the planning. July was nominated for the visit as we felt there was less chance of it either raining or being cold - what we hadn't bargained for was that it fell on the hottest day in the UK since records began - a searing 40C forecast. Despite the heat eleven of the group elected to go.



Creswell Crags is an enclosed limestone gorge where caves preserve internationally unique evidence of how prehistoric people lived at the extreme northern limit of their territory during the last Ice Age (late Pleistocene). Eight of our group ventured into one of these caves, Church Hole, kitted out with hard hats, to view the Stone Age art preserved on the walls within.

The Ice Age seemed very remote as we walking the short distance from the centre to Cave and climbed the steps onto the viewing inside the cave! A very different temperature environment to that our early ancestors

Evidence at the Crags suggests the gorge was a hunting ground for three groups of people at periods of time during an era we refer to as

Age. Stone tools found on the site suggest Neanderthal occupation, 60,000 to 40,000 years ago. The site was also used by modern humans (Gravettian) hunter gatherers, 28,000 years ago. Then the Late Magdalenian hunters who re-colonised the UK after the intense cold of the last glacial period, 14,000

to 15,000 years ago, a period often loosely referred to as 'the Ice Age' and who left behind the Stone Age art we saw at Creswell.

Our guide was very knowledgeable and obviously loved her work at Creswell. She showed us three different pieces of Stone Age art - a red deer, a bison and an ibis bird. It was unclear why these animals were drawn as evidence found at the site suggests the main animals hunted were arctic rabbits. The three pieces appeared to be drawn using different styles and some had marks



underneath. The significance of these marks is not known. It has been suggested the marks may record the animals' migration times or mark lunar weeks. Many of the theories about these paintings have been informed by comparing them to similar cave art found in France and Spain.

Further back in the cave were drawings which resembled upside down geese. It has been suggested these are images of kneeling women. Images of women from this period have been found on the continent. Another unexplained find in the cave are numerous triangles with lines in. These are very similar to one of the earliest ever symbols meaning woman. Again, the significance of women in this cave can only be guessed at.

All the artwork was found in caves on the north side of the site - whilst the caves to the south were those used for shelter. Again, it is unclear why the art is only on the north side. One suggestion was that artists sometimes prefer their studios to be on this side as the light is at its best. The carved outlines are quite faint and any natural paints, like ochre, which may have been used, have now disappeared. In fact, given the damp atmosphere in this region it is miraculous these art pieces have survived at all.



The caves have also been used in later times - in fact Church Hole Cave was used by farmers to shelter their cows during medieval times. The Victorians took interest in the finds in the unfortunately their of excavation left much to desired as they blasted

with explosives - most likely destroying valuable evidence in the

Whilst some of our group puzzled over the cave wall art, the members of the group took a stroll around the site and the museum. Here videos told the story of Creswell and some portable art - engravings on bone and antler- could be seen. Unfortunately, a cup of tea was not to hand as the café had to the hot weather. We were able to purchase ice creams however from the reception.

It will soon be time for the AGM and these papers are in preparation for the event.

At the AGM the membership has to vote in the four Honorary officer posts of Chair, Vice-Chair, Treasurer and Business Secretary.

The current officers, Jim Shervey - Chair, Vacant - Vice-Chair and June Whittle - Business secretary Linda Crossley - Treasurer

All of these positions are open for nominations and the nominating and seconding process is necessary for each office.
