Payment can be made in cash or by cheque. I look forwards to seeing you soon. Regards Mel Mitchell Membership Secretary








CALLING ALL BOOKWORMS!!!

The members of the Book Group met at the Plough on Wednesday 5 April.

One member was away on holiday, but nevertheless we had a pleasant discussion.

One of our latest members Sonja recommended a new author Åsa Larsson who is a Swedish crime-fiction writer.



Although born in Uppsala, she was raised in Kiruna in the far north of Sweden. Prior to becoming a full-time writer, Larsson was a tax lawyer, a profession she shares with the heroine of her novels, Rebecka Martinsson.


Her first publication was Sun Storm, followed by others which are known as 'The Arctic Murders Series' / Nordic Noire .

Originally published under the Swedish title Solstrom in 2003, this book appeared in English as Sun Storm in 2006 and has been reprinted for the UK market entitled The Savage Altar.

Gazing from the window of a modern office in downtown Stockholm, junior law partner Rebecka Martinsson daydreams about her wholesome childhood in Kiruna, a rural town in northern Sweden, unaware that she will soon receive a phone call summoning her to return there. When the local spiritual guru is found brutally murdered, the dead leader's sister Sanna becomes the accused and calls on her childhood friend Rebecka to help sort things out.....

For a debut novel Sun Storm is quite impressive, and lovers of Scandinavian crime fiction will find it very satisfying. The second book in the series is Blood Spirit.

After a long and eventful winter, DCI Ryan and his team are looking forward to the joys of spring. But, when one of their colleagues is shot dead on her own doorstep and the brass think it's an inside job, Ryan finds himself drafted in to investigate. He's barely scratched the surface when reports flood in of a terror explosion at Durham Cathedral. Chaos descends on the sleepy, historic city and, when the smoke clears, they find a priceless artefact that once you belonged to Saint Cuthbert is missing.

With tensions running at an all-time high, unable to trust the local police, can Ryan and his team bring a killer to justice — and restore Cuthbert's cross to its natural resting place?

Murder and mystery are peppered with romance and humour in this fast-paced crime whodunnit set amidst the spectacular landscape of County Durham.

A thoroughly good read and a new author for me recommended by one of our group members Barbara. I'm looking forwards to reading other books in the series.

KEEP CALM AND DO HISTORY

History Group

Adrian Gray spoke to the history group on the 21st of March. His talk was entitled, 'The Top Ten Scandals of Sherwood Forest.' This interesting talk revealed some of the secrets of the local nobility whose estates stand on what was once King's forest. We learned of how a horse ride by Nell Gwynn established the boundaries of Bestwood Park and why the 26 year old Duke of St Albans married a fifty year old actress in 1827. We discovered why you wouldn't want Topham Beauclerk to come and stay in your home and why the 6th Duke of Portland was so relieved that the coffin exhumed at Highgate Cemetery in 1907 actually contained a corpse! These were just a few of the scandals Adrian covered in his talk.

WELL I DIDN'T KNOW THAT!

1 In 1912 an American fur trapper and biologist went to Labrador, he realised that frozen fish and caribou meat tasted as good as fresh food. The name of this man was Clarence BIRDSEYE. He experimented back in America on the best way to freeze food and in 1924 he founded the General Food Corporation selling frozen foods.

2 In 1886 Henry Reynolds who had emigrated to New Zealand from Cornwall built a Butter factory and choose the brand name ANCHOR. Over the next ten

years the business expanded in New Zealand and then globally. In 1969 ANCHOR was the biggest selling brand in Britain and still retains it's position as a firm favourite.

3 In 1869 Arthur Brooke opened a shop in Manchester selling tea sugar and coffee the shop was called BROOKE BOND and Company. There was no Mr Bond he just liked the name Brooke Bond! Gradually it became a wholesale tea merchants. Picture cards were introduced in 1954 the use of chimpanzees for advertising in 1956 and teabags in 1960.

4 In 1864 James ROBERTSON opened a grocery store, one day he bought some oranges which were bitter and did not sell well. His wife suggested she could make them into marmalade to sell. The marmalade was so successful that within 2yrs they had to move to a factory. The business expanded from Scotland to the whole of Britain. The trade mark golly was first used just before the first world war with the badges appearing in the 1930's.
