
Group News



......The members of the Book Group met at the Plough on Wednesday 1 February. Unfortunate a couple of our members were unable to attend due health issues. However, we were very pleased to welcome Barbara and Sonja to the group as new members.

Of all the books we discussed the following two have been chosen for the Newsletter Review.

A Slow Fire Burning by Paula Hawkins.

Paula Hawkins is best known for her previous book The Girl on the Train. Which became a best seller and later a film.

When a young man is found gruesomely murdered in a London houseboat, it triggers questions about three women who knew him. Laura is the troubled one-nightstand last seen in the victim's home. Carla is his grief-stricken aunt, already mourning the recent death of yet another family member.

A Slow Fire Burning, as the title implies, takes its time with the storytelling, concentrating instead on character back story and motivation. And the back stories are tragic. Except for Irene, every other character in the book had a trauma almost too horrible to imagine.

Described as a gripping story that was difficult to put down by the member who reviewed it for the group.

Winter's Children by Leah Fleming

Grieving widow, Kay Partridge and her daughter Evie, unable to face the oncoming. Christmas festivities, move into a cottage at Wintergill Farm in the Yorkshire Dales. Kay wants to shut the door and forget about everything. Evie, just wants her Daddy to come home for Christmas. However, Wintergill Farm is far from the quiet refuge Kay had expected.

The owners of the Farm, Nik Snowden and his Mother Nora ace facing a bleak future, the farm has been devastated by an outbreak of Foot and Mouth and Nik and Nora are at loggerheads. Nora wants to sell the house and the farm and Nik desperately wants to keep the farm and land that has been in the Snowden family for generation.



But Nik is not the only one attached to the house and farm. In the distant past a terrible tragedy took place there and since that time restless spirits have haunted the land seeking a child that once was lost. Through the subsequent generations these spirits gave brought misery and pain to bear on the farms inhabitants. But where one spirit has brought despair another has sought to protect the children of Wintergill.

Described as a ghost story with a difference by the group member who recommended it.

The next meeting of the Group is scheduled for Wednesday 1 March, 2pm at the Plough in Warsop.

History Group

The history group met on Tuesday 17th January 2023 at St Theresa's church hall. It was lovely to see so many regular members attend after the Christmas break and to welcome new faces to our group. Denis Hill visited us to speak about Newstead Abbey and its owners. Denis worked as a tour guide at the Abbey for several years and has researched its history in some depth. He shared some very interesting information with us, starting with the abbey's beginnings. Most of us were unaware of the connection between the founding of the abbey and the murder of Thomas Becket in 1170. The funding for the building of the abbey given by Henry II was part of Henry's penance for the death of the Archbishop of Canterbury, along with the rebuilding of Edwinstowe Church and other gifts to the church.

The building was situated on the King's Highway between Nottingham Castle and Bolsover Castle and so there were a few royal visitors to Newstead. These included King John (1207), Henry II, Edward II, Edward III and Charles II. Hosting royalty was a costly business. Twice the monks had to pawn the abbey's gold and silver.

Newstead Abbey is one of the most complete medieval monasteries left in the country, the oldest parts being the north suite and the dark entry on the southeast side.

Newstead was in fact a priory as opposed to an abbey and was home to Augustinian monks until the dissolution in the 1530s, when the priory church was demolished, and the remaining buildings were sold to Sir John Byron of Colwick Hall who bought the 1200-acre site for £810. Stone from the demolished church was used to rebuild the cloisters, which were originally built from wood.

The abbey remained in the Byron family for some time. We learned of some very interesting characters who inherited this building. Little Sir John Byron with the big beard was responsible for creating the library. His ghost has been seen by some. His son, Anthony, should have inherited the abbey but died whilst hunting with his father - not from a hunting accident but from laughing! He played a cruel joke on a friend's horse and laughed so much at his own prank he apparently died! The 5th Sir Byron was ousted from Newstead by the Parliamentarians during the Civil War as he fought for the king. He was governor of Newark before going into exile when the monarchy fell. He was one of only two people who fought for Charles I who was not pardoned by Cromwell, who called him 'a dangerous delinquent.' The monarch rewarded Sir Byron's service by making him a Lord – the 1st Lord Byron. His brother Richard inherited the title. He was one of the founding members of the Sealed Knot, whose aim was to lead an uprising against Cromwell. He was taken prisoner and imprisoned in the Tower of London until the monarchy was restored. The 4th Lord Byron was an art collector and installed one of the biggest art collections in the country at Newstead. The 5th Lord Byron was nicknamed 'Devil B' or 'wicked Lord'. He killed his cousin in a duel but escaped punishment and shot his coachman for not driving fast enough. Unhappy about his son's marriage to a Catholic and a woman of no fortune he punished his son. He could not stop him inheriting so he set about managing Newstead so badly and spending his money that the boy would inherit nothing of value. When 5th Lord Byron died it was said there was only one roof which did not leak at Newstead as the property was in such poor repair. Ironically his son did not outlive him to inherit the property. 'Foul Weather Jack', an admiral notorious for his reckless decisions at sea, and 'Mad Jack' were heirs to the property, but they died before inheriting. Newstead passed to Mad Jack's son from his second marriage to Catherine Gordon, the poet Lord Byron who was a notorious womaniser. He was 10 years old when he inherited but Newstead was in disrepair and there was little money for renovation. Byron married Anne Isabella Millbank and they had a daughter, Ada Lovelace – a notable mathematician. Byron left for the continent when Ada was born. He sold Newstead to a friend, Thomas Wildman, who had inherited a fortune from his father and uncles which was made through the slave trade. He renovated the abbey but as he had no heirs it was sold to William Frederick Webb upon his death. The property passed to the Fraser family who sold it in the 1930s to Sir Julian Cahn, a self-made millionaire and it then became the property of the city council. The group discussed the forthcoming events of the history group and voted to see who wished to go on the three visits planned for the coming year.


