Below I have listed details of two of the books they reviewed.





Gripping, moving and wildly exhilarating, *Mud, Sweat and Tears* is a must-read for adrenalin junkies and armchair adventurers alike.

Bear Grylls is a man who has always sought the ultimate in adventure. Growing up on the Isle of Wight, he was taught by his father to sail and climb at an early age. As a teenager he found identity and purpose through both mountaineering and martial arts, which led the young adventurer to the foothills of the mighty Himalaya and a grandmaster's karate training camp in Japan.

On returning home, he embarked upon the notoriously gruelling selection course for the British Special Forces to join 21 SAS - a journey that was to push him to the very limits of physical and mental endurance.

Then, in a horrific free-fall parachuting accident, Bear broke his back in three places. It was touch and go whether he would ever walk again. However, only eighteen months later Bear became one of the youngest ever climbers to scale Everest, aged only twenty-three. But this was just the beginning of his many extraordinary adventures . . .

"War Lord" By Bernard Cornwell



After a lifetime of fighting, the great warrior Lord Uhtred is ready to hang up his sword. But as long as the kingdom remains divided, peace is fragile – and Uhtred will never be safe in his Northumbrian fortress.

As kings in the north and south grow more bloodthirsty for power, history marches inexorably towards war. And Uhtred has no choice but to throw himself into the fire.

In the most terrible battle Britain has ever experienced, with the kingdom's future resting on a knife edge, Uhtred takes his stand on one side of the shield wall. Only fate will decide the outcome.

History Group



The history group met on Tuesday 16th May and welcomed Denis Hill, a local historian, who came to speak to us about the history of the nearby village of Wellow.

This was a fascinating talk which highlighted that Wellow is an unusual village in many respects. It is a 'planted' village and it was created around 1180 AD around the time Rufford Abbey was founded to accommodate the people from the villages of Rufford, Crately and Wirchenfeld who were evicted from their homes to make way for the abbey. It was situated by the village of Grimston which surrounded Jordan Castle owned by the Folliet family and was originally named 'Grimston cum Wellow'. When Grimston ceased to be a village in the 1500s the first part of the name was dropped, and it just became 'Wellow'.

Wellow is also unusual in that it is enclosed by a dyke which provided a water supply and acted as a cattle compound. It is strategically placed on the boundary with Sherwood Forest so that Forest Law did not apply there and was adjacent to the A614 originally. It is also one of the few villages in Nottinghamshire with a village green. This is not the usual shape; it is triangular – the shape of an arrowhead and pointing directly towards Nottingham Castle! Was this a message from the people of Wellow to their overlords who threw them out of their homes?

Wellow is also one of a handful of villages left with a permanent maypole and each year holds the ancient ritual of crowning the May Queen. It also still has a Lord of the Manor.

For anyone wanting to know more about Wellow and its heritage, Denis has two booklets available. One is entitled 'Wellow Heritage, a Visitor's Guide to this Quintessential North Nottinghamshire Village.' The other is 'A tribute to our Wellow War Heroes.' Each costs £2.

Denis also told us about a trail around Wellow which quite a few people were interested in. Barbara is taking the names of anyone wanting to participate in this and looking at possible dates for it to take place. If you are interested, please speak to Barbara and put your name on the list.

The steering group met recently, when we looked at next year's events for the History Group. We aim to share this information with you at our next History Group meeting on 20th June. This will be held at St Theresa's Church Hall, Warsop. We will be welcoming Chris Weir back to speak about bygone times in his talk, 'Kill or Cure.' We look forward to seeing you all there – bring a friend.
