# "Is Al the future for family history research?"

In 2019, **Ancestry.com** started to use **Artificial Intelligence**: **AI** (workforce educated machine-learning algorithms) that can sift through their genealogical data at lightning speed...

Now, **AI** is unlocking the mysteries of the **Vatican's Secret Archives**, one of the grandest historical collections in the world. It's also one of the most <u>useless</u>!

Some thirty-five thousand volumes of records from the eighth century, which includes <u>account books</u> and letters from Michelangelo, **Henry VIII** requesting marriage annulment, and letters from Abraham Lincoln to the Pope. **The problem:** they are mostly in **ancient LATIN handwriting!** 

However, all was not lost, researchers in Italy at Roma Tre University recently published the findings of a project called Codice Ratio or "The Code System"

Using **AI** (machine learning) and **OCR** (optical-character-recognition) they have been able to generate the exact transcription for 65% of the word images of the ancient LATIN handwriting.

Now the future looks good for **Manorial Records** where most family history researchers can only get back to the 1538 Parish Records, to get back further you need to study **LATIN** and **Palaeography** – old handwriting found in documents written between 1086 and 1500.

"Why is the 11th day of the 11th month important this year, because along with our Remembrance Day, it's the 400th anniversary of the 'Mayflower' Pilgrims arriving in America"...

Almost 35 million people are descended from the 'Mayflower' Pilgrims, of the 132 known passengers and crew, was one of them your families ancestor?

Celebrate the voyage's 400th anniversary by uncovering the stories of those onboard, when the Mayflower arrived in America and set anchor in present-day Cape Cod, at Provincetown Harbour in Massachusetts on the **11th November 1620**. The settlers were forced to endure their first winter unprepared; as a result, only about half of those recorded survived those harsh first months.

During the vessel's ten weeks at sea, the 'Mayflower Compact' was created and signed, it recorded the essential details of those on-board and established a rudimentary form of democracy for the new settlement. Transcripts list the Pilgrims' names, birth year, places of birth and their relationship to others on the ship while images may reveal additional details. The Compact only includes those that actually sailed on the Mayflower and does not include other members of the Puritan group that stayed in England or the Netherlands. However, if you haven't got a **Findmypast** account you can get information from **FamilySearch.org** which is <u>free</u> and has a **Full Passenger List** which includes both Separatists and Non-Separatists, or "Strangers" to help establish the Colony of Virginia, the Indentured Servants and the Contracted Mayflower Crew but <u>more important</u> is the list of '**Mayflower Passengers with Known Descendants**' just simply sign into your FamilySearch account.
