April Monthly Meeting

The speaker at the meeting on April 20th at the Barbour Institute will be Christina Spencer. Christina was born in Leipzig in what was then East Germany and her talk "Life on the other side" recounts the life of ordinary Germans during one of their darkest periods of history. The meeting opens at 2pm with the speaker slot starting at 2.30pm.



March Meeting

Fifty two members and 8 potential new members joined us at our meeting in March. Brian Anderson's entertaining introduction to the Yellowstone National Park was full of interesting facts. The wild landscape was founded, as a park, by a group led by Ferdinand Hayden in 1872 and their work was documented by Thomas Moran (an artist born in the UK) and the innovative photographer William H Jackson (famous for his true-life photos of the American Civil War).

Brian showed examples of hot springs, cone geysers, mud pots and fumaroles, emphasising the physical dangers to visitors of the hot, sulphurous waters. Wildlife is abundant in the park including grizzly bears, moose, elk and gray (note the

deliberate spelling of gray) wolves which have recently been reintroduced to rebalance the hierarchy of species. Brian stressed the idiocy of humans who ignore warning signs and approach bison for photo opportunities. The final part of Brian's talk focused on the management's encouragement of eco-tourism and scientific research and the provision of local jobs. His final sound-bite - there is a one in ten thousand chance of a super-eruption in the park!


