Fearing the worst and before he was taken by the authorities, their father packed a box of

personal items including Christina's doll, Barbara. During the hostilities Christine and her sister lost contact with both their parents and were evacuated eastwards, subsequently moving to an orphanage in Munich, before being re-settled in their uncle's house in Hamburg. Eventually the parents were released from captivity and the girls went back to Leipzig with them. As life under communist control became more difficult the family moved westwards and managed to reach West Germany before the borders were finally sealed. The story had a happy outcome in that their parents survived the war and eventually the family (and Barbara) were reunited. This was a truly fascinating insight into the hardships of life of ordinary Germans during one of their darkest periods of history.

Sunday Lunch Group



On Saturday 15th April the Art Appreciation Group attended Carden Park for a tour of the sculptures entitled "The Edge of Nature" by a renowned artist, Emma Rodgers. Grant Ford, BBC's Antiques Roadshow expert and Fine Art curator, introduced Emma Rodgers to the audience, along with the Sculpture Garden which is set against the stunning backdrop of the luxury resort.

Emma Rodgers was a prize winner at the V&A whilst still at university and since then has featured in several major international public and private collections including V&A, Saatchi as well as Art Paris, New York and Lineart ,Ghent and Singapore.

Her works include the iconic Cilla Black statue in Liverpool, the 11m Hornby Liver Bird, as well as being commissioned by Marvel films for the set of Guardians of the Galaxy. She is classed as one of Britain's leading ceramic sculptors using mediums of clay and bronze, pushing them to the edge of their elasticity to create powerful, challenging, delicate, tender, disturbing and yet ethereally beautiful statuary.

On what started out as a lovely sunny morning 5 of us met up at Walk Mill, open because of the Bank Holiday. We headed in the direction of Stapleford, but turned right before the farm. Following a track then many fields with surprisingly long grass we eventually arrived at the Gowy. The decision was made here to take the shorter path back to the Mill, so after following the path through several more fields we eventually continued along the Gowy back to the Mill. The rain had arrived



by this time so we were very happy to seek shelter and refreshments there.

Our Monday walk on 17th April led by Marjorie started from the Yeld and was a circular walk round the Old Pale, which took us to an area we'd not seen before. We went up to Pale Heights in low cloud and light rain, so no lovely views, then we headed east and did a circuit of Eddisbury hill fort which is actually lower than the Heights and not at all a feature in the landscape until you get to the southern side of it.



A section on the line of the Roman road from Northwich to Chester with a couple of interesting historical features brought us back to the Sandstone Trail and the lane back up the Yeld. About 4 miles.
