AGM Summary Report

This is a summary of the AGM which preceded our meeting in June.

The minutes from last year's AGM were approved. WCRu3a's outgoing Chair, Kathie Dowson reported on the previous year's activities. This year had been a successful one and WCRu3a continues to have a strong membership in terms of numbers and those willing to be involved, whether it be as a committee member, as a group leader or helping with the refreshments at our monthly meeting. Kathie thanks the many members who contribute to the success of our u3a.

Linda Davenport, Treasurer, presented her annual report. The proposed increase in subscriptions from the Third Age Trust was not passed at the AGM, and our rent increases for our meeting venues were below the inflation rate. These elements combined indicate that we are heading into a calmer period, and our projected Core Costs Budget for this financial year is showing a significantly lower potential shortfall than last year at around. £250.00 - a figure which can well be accommodated within our current funding arrangements. The meeting voted unanimously to approve the audited accounts. Members also agreed unanimously to reappoint Carole Cullen as auditor for the 2023/24 accounts.

Marian Hagan was the only nominee for the position of Chair and was confirmed in the role by a show of hands. There is still a vacancy on the committee. We would be pleased to welcome any member who is interested to come along to a committee meeting. The next committee meeting will be on the 3rd July at 10am. Please contact a committee member if you would like to join us.

The AGM ended with a presentation by Marian to Kathie Dowson to mark the tremendous contribution she has made to the success of West Cheshire Rural u3a. Don't worry, Kathie has said she will continue to make the delicious cakes for the monthly meeting!
