## **Charity Commission Registration – Gift Aid**

Following West Cheshire Rural u3a's Charity Commission registration, we have now registered with HMRC to enable us to claim gift aid on our membership fees.

Gift Aid is a UK government initiative that allows charities to reclaim 25p on every £1 of your membership fee at no extra cost to you. This means that by simply confirming that you are a taxpayer on your membership form and signing up for Gift Aid, you can significantly boost the value of your membership. It is optional but if you are a UK tax payer, we hope that you will participate.

The additional funds enable us to meet increasing costs, helps us to maintain relatively low membership fees and continue to book interesting and professional speakers for the meetings.

#### Walk Leaders Responsibilities

- doing the walk recce in advance
- providing the description of the walk to Anne Bayliss (Is it hilly? Are there stiles on the route etc)
- Your email will be included on the invitation which will ask members who want to walk will email you direct stating:
  - Where they will meet, at Alisons or at the start of the walk
  - Do they need a lift from Tattenhall
  - Will they stay for lunch (if that is offered)
- organising a coffee or lunch stop at the end of the walk (optional)
- make sure that there are car shares so that everyone can get to the start of the walk. This has been easy as there are usually more than enough people willing to meet at Alisons and drive.

#### Cancelling a walk

- If the walk leader cannot do their walk at short notice, we would cancel the walk by email or perhaps a WhatsApp message if it is on the day. (Only one walk was cancelled this year due to adverse weather).
- If the walk leader wants to change their planned walk date, they should try to find someone else to swap with. There will be a list of dates and walk leaders on the website so you can see who is doing which walk each month. If no one can swap with you, then the walk may need to be cancelled.

We can make this work if we work together. We can keep it under review and tweak things if it can be improved.

#### Booking a holiday with Riviera Travel could benefit WCRu3a
