Mr Michael was both amusing and erudite, as he told us of his rise from the east end of London to becoming a barrister in Middle Temple, one of the four Inns of Court in the city. His talk was peppered with fascinating facts about the Middle Temple itself, his

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confrontations with the notorious Kray twins and the dreadful racism he experienced in his first chambers, where he was called, amongst other things, a 'Jew Boy' and was the victim of those more senior barristers, who refused to let him take their 'returned' cases because of his less-than-privileged background. Simon Michael's talk was very amusing and enlightening, particularly about police corruption and politicians' bad behaviour. The audience was left wanting more...

THE D DAY LANDINGS

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An illustrated talk on the D Day Landings given by amateur military enthusiast, Alan Robinson, who has led many battlefield visits and is an entertaining speaker, much in demand.

July 2024 will see the eightieth anniversary of the D Day landings in Normandy by Anglo-American forces. The landings were not an end in themselves but were the first step in establishing the forces of the Western Allies on the North European plain which leads eventually into the heartland of Germany. As such, the landings marked the beginning of the end of Nazi Germany.

For Britain, the landings marked a reversal in the fortunes of war which saw the British army ejected from mainland Europe in the Spring of 1940. For many Britons living at the time, D Day was to become an iconic day. It was a day long remembered. Many had played a role in preparing for the landings and many had taken part in the landings. Although the landings were successful and casualties were mercifully light, there was considerable trepidation beforehand amongst leaders and in the military hierarchy that the landings would result in a bloodbath and be a failure. That the landings were successful was due in large measure to the planning and the preparations made. The talk will discuss the planning and preparations that took place and give an account of the airborne and amphibious landings which took place.
