Indeed, Chester is the only place in Britain to have retained the tradition of a regular midday proclamation at a fixed place and time (12 noon, Tuesday-Saturday, between May and August). In medieval England the job of the town crier (or bellman) was to inform

townspeople of the latest news, proclamations, by-laws and any other important information as most folk were illiterate. Proclaiming the news was not their only role. Originally, they patrolled the streets after dark acting as peace-keepers, arresting miscreants and taking them to the stocks for punishment. It was also their job to make sure fires were damped down for the night after the curfew bell. David's talk was articulate, funny, refreshing and highly entertaining and he left many of us aching with laughter.

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U3A Membership Renewal 2024/25 and Gift Aid update

Starting from the next financial year, April 2024 -March 2025, our u3a will be participating in the Gift Aid Scheme which allows charities like us to claim 25p for every £1.00 donation we receive.

The good news is that your annual Membership Subscription fee counts as a donation.

What does this mean for you?

- There's no extra cost to you.
- Taking part in the Gift Aid Scheme is optional you choose.
- You can opt out of the Gift Aid Scheme at any time.

To opt in – What do I do?

- For your Membership fee to be part of the Gift Aid Scheme, just follow the instructions on your Membership Renewal Invitation 2024/25, and
- Fill in the Gift Aid Declaration Form we will send you it confirms you are a UK taxpayer.

How much could Gift Aid benefit WCRu3a each year?

- If 100 members sign up, WCRu3a receives £450.00 equivalent to 25 new • members.
- If 150 members sign up, our annual benefit rises to £675.00.

What Happens Next?

You will soon receive your Membership Renewal Invitation 2024/25. This year we have streamlined the service so you'll receive either an invitation to renew online or an invitation to renew by cheque or in cash, dependent on how you chose to pay last year. You can renew in cash at our next Monthly Meeting on the 24th March.

Both Invitations to renew ask you to reply to Dorothy Turpy, our Membership Secretary. Please do this - it forms part of your membership renewal. Please wait till you get the email before you renew.

In your reply, please indicate whether you want to participate in the Gift Aid Scheme. This is your expression of interest – you will be sent a formal Gift Aid Declaration Form at a later date.

Our first Gift Aid claim will be submitted in April/May 2025. We should receive our payment from HMRC within 4 weeks.
