Our first sample was a rather nice Portuguese blush called Maria Fadista – who was of course a leading Fado singer – see, we embrace the u3a ethos of learning. A 'Stones and Bones' Tinto (red) from a vineyard near Lisbon is apparently made on a terroir largely comprising dinosaur bones. Yea, right, although it was judged to have plenty of body....

The overall standard of our samples was adjudged high, only one being given the accolade "it's all right." Roger presented an Ancient Root Reformada, a crowd funded wine of 6 grape varieties including from the oldest Graciano vineyard in the world, apparently. It was very fine although repeat orders are impossible – it has sold out.

Our next meeting will be on the 24<sup>th</sup> April at Alan's Way 7.30pm with the theme Chilean Wines.
