

Whitby Neighbourhood Plan

Work is beginning on the Whitby Neighbourhood Plan and will continue for the next 18 months.

What is a neighbourhood plan?

The Whitby Neighbourhood Plan is a planning policy document written by the community to guide future development in the area over the next 15-20 years. It will set out planning policies for your area and can:

Protect local green spaces.

Encourage better designed places.

Bring forward housing that genuinely meets local needs.

Protect important heritage assets

Support businesses and employment

Improve infrastructure

The Plan will be written by the local community and will help get the right types of development, in the right place.

The Plan content will be based on feedback from the local community and the results of public consultations, but having regard to national and local policy and guidance.

If successful at referendum, the Neighbourhood Plan will become part of the statutory development plan for the area and will be used by North Yorkshire Council to determine future planning applications and by developers to shape and influence the design of their developments.

Who is involved?

A local Steering Group, involving a mix of Town Councillors and local residents. The group will be listening to feedback from the community to form the content of the Plan.

Neighbourhood Plan area

The Plan area covers the entire parish of Whitby.

Participation and consultation

In order to produce a plan that genuinely reflects the needs and opportunities of Whitby, it is important that residents make their views known. Please look out for and participate in our consultation and feedback events.

Concert Outing

I have been able to secure 25 tickets for the Sage Gateshead on Friday 5th April, at £38 each; however, if we sell all 25 tickets there will be a discount of approx.10%. At present there are a good number of tickets still available. The concert starts at 7.30pm and the coach will leave Whitby at 4.45pm.

Cost will be £55-60, depending on numbers, and a £35 deposit is required to secure a ticket. Reservations can be made, and deposits paid, at the coffee morning in February, but note that the coffee morning in March would be too late, as tickets have to be bought and paid for by the beginning of March. History Group St. John Ambulance Hall Thursdays (weekly). 2 – 4 pm

Our sessions for the new year began with an excellent presentation on the remarkable life and abilities of 'Serenissimus' (Grigory Potemkin – Catherine the Great's military leader, adviser and favourite). Potemkin's contribution to Russian expansion was highly significant, with implications that extend to the present day. Following that initial talk our programme was interrupted by Storm Isha and the presentation covering the links between popular folk music, cultural protest and poetic expression has now been re-scheduled to May. However, we were able to meet at the end of the month and June McLeave's recounting of her personal history and family situation, and their laudable efforts to raise funds for cancer research, met with a positive response from listeners.

Our programme for February begins with a special guest presentation from Joanne Aston on 'Shackleton's Trans-Antarctic Expedition of 1914'.



This lecture will cover the remarkable story of the Imperial Trans-Antarctic Expedition, including the loss of *Endurance* and the less well-known fate of the *Aurora*.

It is worth remembering the local connection to that expedition in that Eric Wild, Shackleton's second-in-command, was from Skelton (there is a plaque in his honour in the village). [Note that the class fee for this particular lecture will be £3.00].

Monthly Lecture Group St. John Ambulance Hall Tuesdays (3rd monthly), 10 – 12 noon.

Unfortunately, our speaker for January (Michael Kirke) was unable to visit because of ill health. As a stand in for his talk, Rick Harwood followed up his December presentation on our search for life in the universe with discussion and video on the origins of the planets in our solar system.

Michael Kirke's presentation of the voyage of HMS Beagle has been re-scheduled to this February's lecture.

He recounts life on board HMS Beagle during Darwin's voyage through the diaries of the pilot, James Kirke, an historic family member of the speaker. The diaries detail surveying the waters around Tierra del Fuego, encounters with rebels/deserters and natives (brought back to England!), and survival in gigantic Cape Horn storms.

Cycling Club

As the days start to lengthen and temperatures start to rise it is a good time to think about getting your bike out again. Before starting any ride the bike, it is always worthwhile to do a quick M check. If the bike hasn't been used for several weeks then it is more important. As the members who expressed an interest in cycling have a range of expectations, availabilities and abilities, I am proposing that we vary the

rides as follows, hopefully starting in March:- Week 1, meet at 9.30am on a Tuesday, usually at the Castle Park bus stop (above Lidl / Spar) and do a longer ride, probably back for a late lunch. Week 2, meet at 1.30pm on the Thursday, usually by Beevers, and do a shorter ride with a coffee / scones / ice cream break somewhere along the way. All rides may include a mixture of both on-road and off-road cycling but route details will be available beforehand.

Riding Tips When riding on the road, don't cycle too close to the kerb, you should be at least an arms- length away. When not pedalling, on a straight road, aim to keep the left side pedal at the bottom (this keeps the oily chain away from your right leg / ankle When not pedalling around a bend or corner, put the pedal that is on the outside of the curve to the bottom and put more weight onto it. This stops the inside pedal catching on the road as the bike leans into the bend. When not pedalling on an off-road track, aim to keep the pedals level so as to avoid them hitting tree stumps or the edges of ruts. When riding off-road try to take your weight off the seat and transfer most of it to the pedals, use bent legs to absorb bumps and lightly grasp the seat between your thighs.

The M check. Starting at the front wheel, check that the tyre is correctly inflated then grasp the wheel firmly between your legs and try to wiggle the handlebars. If the bars move but the wheels don't then the steering head needs tightening. Whilst at the handlebars, apply the front brake and attempt to push the bike forward, it should not move. Now apply the rear brake and try to push the bike backwards, again the bike should not move. Now move down to the pedals and grasp each in turn and try to pull and push the crank away and towards the frame. No movement

should be possible. Then rotate the crank backwards to see if the chain moves freely. At the seat, try pulling and pushing the seat sideways whilst holding the bike firmly. Now sit on the seat and the toes of both feet should be just able to touch the ground. Finally move to the back wheel and check that

the tyre is correctly inflated.

There will be the regular monthly TOAST meeting on Saturday 3rd February at the Penny Hedge starting at 10am. I hope many of you can make it as we move into 2024 with our new arrangements. There is now a small committee operational to ensure there are at least one or two events every month, with occasional help from others in the TOAST group who would be happy to assist. We hope you continue to be supportive and particularly appreciate your suggestions for outings which you think would be suitable.
