
Whitby Whaler January 2024

Many thanks to all of you who completed our survey on registration day and elsewhere. We had 81 replies (around 14% of our membership) and have now finished collating the responses. We hope your replies and comments will help us understand a little more about what our members want and need from our u3a.

For example, around 40% of those who responded to our survey said that they weren't aware that the national u3a website offered a wide selection of free online courses and expressed an interest in finding out more about them.

Some of these upcoming sessions, which are presented via Zoom, feature everything from practical topics such as 'How to better insulate your home' and an 'introduction to the Air Fryer' to talks on subjects as varied as Toulouse-Lautrec, Secrets of the Brain, and the Baha'i faith (the latest in a series on World faiths), as well as online exercise sessions such as Chinese Wand exercises and Laughter Yoga.

National u3a Festival, July 2024

As mentioned in the last Newsletter the National u3a Festival will be held at York University from Thursday 18th July to Saturday 20th July. There will be a wide variety of activities - talks, sporting events, musical entertainment and workshops. Details of the schedule and costs are as follows:

- Day 1, Thursday 18th July (from lunchtime) £25 including buffet supper
- Day 2, Friday 19th July £10 for the full day
- Day 3, Saturday 20th July (morning) £5 for a half day
- Full festival to include all 3 days and a buffet supper on Day 1 £35

For those who would like to stay for the three days accommodation will be available on the University campus at a cost of £61.80 for bed and breakfast.

Registration is not yet open but if enough members are interested in going for the day on Friday 19th July it may be possible to arrange a coach – there will be a list available at coffee mornings for anyone who's interested to sign up.

History Group St. John Ambulance Hall Thursdays (weekly). 2 – 4 pm

Our final two sessions in December covered a photographic history of Sandsend (Neil Williamson) and our now traditional 'smorgasbord' of shorter presentations given by a series of different people on historical topics of particular interest. Both sessions were well-attended, interesting and enjoyable.

Our talks for the new year begin on the 11th January and our programme covers the usual range of local and wide-ranging historical topics given by some regular and some new speakers. Ruth Harwood begins with a talk

on 'Serenissimus'. Venice is often referred to as Serenissima – but who was Serenissimus? (Nothing to do with Venice but there is a link to one of the dreadful wars currently happening.) Our second presentation departs somewhat from normal

and covers the links between popular folk music, cultural protest and poetic expression.


Cycling Club
